My romance book club is doing this category challenge designed to broaden our reading horizons, however, and one of the categories is "Amish romance. My suspicions were on fleek: I was cool with that, and hoping to learn about the Amish community and maybe enjoy a fluffy but unrealistic love story shared between two teens. Instead, I got a pretty unhealthy, almost emotionally abusive relationship between two horribly unlikable characters, with a side order of misogyny, slut-shaming, and bad life choices. The jealous Amish girl who wants to court Noah calls Rose a "hure. Oh, I think so. The abusive relationship Noah makes Rose feel bad about herself in an attempt to sway her to his way of thinking. I suddenly say not only my family as an obstacle to a marriage with Rose but also her family, and especially her older brother. I had underestimated his interest in the matter. When she fights him about converting to being Amish, he slut-shames her. Then it gets disturbing. He starts thinking about ways to force her - and her family - to marry her to him. He considers impregnating her to force a shotgun marriage. Another idea had briefly penetrated my brain - getting her with child. My folks and her dad would be forced to allow us to marry. But Noah thinks the baby idea is a great one, and proposes it to Rose, who gets upset. When she refuses, he has this to say: Likewise, Noah considers courting Ella from his community - the girl who called Rose "hure" - but is repulsed by their kiss and ends up ditching her and their families early. Rose is so distraught at the thought of losing him forever that she immediately gives in to all his terms, agreeing not just to converting to being Amish but also: The book cheerfully ends with Rose getting sent off to live with another Amish family to prepare for her conversion to Amish life. I really tried to read this with an open mind. It made me angry and frustrated. Rose was such an awful character. Noah was an annoying, manipulative character. The treatment of all the female characters was abhorrent. They were the only truly likable characters in here. You may very well feel differently, and if that is the case, I respect you for it. However, if the quotes I provided upset you or annoy you, you should probably find a different Amish book to read. What do you guys think?

I am not an expert on this subject, but I know there are a number of Ex-Amish that have went to Columbia, MO to start a new life. From what I understand, the Ex Amish limited schooling is a real detractor from getting a great job but the Amish upbringing of being a hard worker is a big plus. June 21st, at Thus, while they would not be supervised or reprimanded like children, they would not be allowed to participate in community life like an adult. Only through joining the church would one be allowed adult responsibilities and participation. Till then one lives in a world somewhere between childhood and adulthood and the older one gets, the more uncomfortable this twilight world becomes, thus forcing one to be baptized or to leave. If one leaves, life is no different than it would be for any other kid raised in a conservative rural family that leaves home young. Sure there are things that other teenagers know, but how long does it take to learn how to use the TV remote or the ATM card. To tune in a radio station, switch on a light, use the microwave timer, ipod, computer, dishwasher, etc. The Amish runaway is ignorant not retarded. The hardest part is not in learning how to live in the english world, thats easy, but in having no knowledge of things such as sports teams, the rules and who the players are, or of famous people, or of musical stuff like instruments, popstars, hit songs, etc. One is like a cultural foreigner, always having to ask questions. This makes people laugh, shake their heads and look at you like you are retarded. Like last year, the first time I saw a flat screen TV up close, mounted on the wall at work. I asked my work college where the box was with the rest of it, you know the working parts. I thought it was like a desk top computer, with screen and workng parts separate. One learns to laugh with people when ones ignorance shows, if not one will soon develop a persecution complex. The hardest thing at first about living in the english world is how selfish and uncaring most everybody is, also how angry and aggressive people are. Not to mention false and deceptive. But it is what it is and one just learns to live with it. In the secular world one molds the world to oneself. In the church world, one moulds oneself to the church discipline. In both worlds, those that succeed remain. Failures in the secular world become dropouts and in the church world, shunned. The only question is if one wants to mould or be moulded, both ways have their unique challenges and rewards. Another strange difference is that in the secular world I have freedom of action but not of speech, whereas in the church world I have freedom of speech but not of action. For example, In the secular world if I said I gambled, no protest, however if I said that gambling should be legal for children people would protest. In the church world I could say that gambling should be legal for children, no comment, yet if I said I went gambling, there would be an uproar. In the secular world people are more concerned about whether ones speech is offensive or not and not if it is true or false, whereas in the church world people are more concerned about whether ones speech is true or false and not if it is offensive. Two different worlds with two different mindsets. However, it is much, much harder to join the church world than to join the secular world, gaining freedom is easier to bear than losing freedom. While one has more freedom during these years in the sense of liberty to leave the home more freely and return later in the evening and miss supper, one still behaves and does the right things in front of ones parents. It is behind ones parents backs that one gets up to mischief. The stuff you hear some kids getting up to they would never do in front of their parents or any another adult who would tell on them. As my father always said "you are never to old for a klap smack The kids have an unwritten code that they will not tat on each other, unless it is something really bad or life threating. When the parents seem horrified when their kids are caught doing something bad, its a genuine emotion, at home those kids no doubt acted like little angels. There are things I did in my youth I would never tell my parents, even now, they would be just as horrified as if I had done it yesterday. Some things only those present at the time should know about and will hopefully go to their graves without talking. Shame has no respect for the years that have flowed by. As to going to other churches, some would go if they have religious outside engels friends who invite them. Generally it would be to a Sunday night youth service. The morning service in broad daylight is far too exposed. I went once with a friend to a Pentecostal mega-church as support. At that time I did not know those words. He had been invited by some girl he had met and asked me to go with him. Being curious I agreed. It was shocking what I saw, it is possible it still gives me nightmares. It did not feel like church and if we had not been driven there in a car for over an hour, I may well have walked home before the service started. During the service I saw people rolling around on the floor screaming and crying and laughing like mad people. I thought they would attack me and rip me apart, boy was I scared. Generally most of the people were jumping around and carrying on most strangely during the service. The music played by their rock and roll band sounded like secular radio and not at all worshipful. What I saw there that night was an image from hell. Guess when you come back to the youth with stories about the madness, foreignness and strangeness of other churches, their desire to visit is diminished. It sure cured my curiosity. Till this day I will not go anywhere near a church that calls itself Pentecostal or Charismatic. Truth be told it is hard to go to a regular church, everything is different. One could go to a conservative Mennonite church, but one might as well stay with the Amish, the only real difference is that the one uses electricity and cars and the other does not. I certainly do believe in Jesus as Lord and Savior, more so now than before. Before it was in ignorance, now its with knowledge thanks to exposure to Baptist churches, their doctrine is good, but their practice is worldly. They claim to be believers yet live like the unbelievers. Unlike Mose, I separated what was biblical from what the elders taught. In my mind there are four levels. The first is biblical and binding upon all Christians such as head coverings. The second is from the early elders of the first church who have added to head coverings such as its for all Christian women, baptised or not and to be worn all the time, not just when praying or prophesising. The third is the founding elders of the various modern groups who added that all women in their group should wear the same style and color head covering. And forthly our current elders who will make rules applicable for this generation. If I am not under their authority, I have no obligation to obey them. Depending on the age and gender of the Amish child, certain duties and responsibilities are required of them from sunup to sundown. This means that every member of the family gets up and completes their morning duties. Amish children all have their own household chores to perform, such as sweeping, making the beds, shoveling snow, feeding the farm animals, collecting eggs, or helping their parents with their morning chores. This can last for several hours each morning and must be completed before they have to get ready for school. All Amish children are required to attend school from the first grade to the eighth grade. Amish children do not attend public schools, but instead go to a one-room school house that is located near their homes. Each morning Amish children walk to school and spend the majority of the day studying. Amish children learn to speak Pennsylvania Dutch when they are young, but when they go to school they also learn to speak English and German. They also learn the basics of reading, writing, and mathematics, just like other children their age. Amish girls will primarily learn how to be good wives and mothers. They are taught how to cook, bake, sew, quilt, clean, raise children, and drive buggies. Amish boys are taught how to manage finances, prepare the fields, use tools, and drive a horse and buggy team. In between their studies, Amish children are allowed to be creative and play throughout the day, all the while keeping within the strict beliefs of the Amish way of life. The Amish are allowed to play many of the same games that other children do, like baseball and soccer, but they are not played competitively. Amish schools do not promote the ideas of ambition, competition, and pride. They believe that every member of the Amish community has value and to pit one member against another, even during playtime, creates negativity and directs focus to the individual rather than the group. Therefore, competitive games are played solely for fun and exercise. Scores are not kept and everyone is encouraged to participate. Creativity is also allowed in Amish schools and many children will learn to draw, make crafts, or write poetry. This is especially important in the months before Christmas where most Amish school children will put on a Christmas program that will include religious-themed play productions, poetry readings, caroling, and arts and crafts. The Christmas program is usually one of the most anticipated events throughout the year and the children are encouraged to do their best in making it fun for the entire community. The period may last from a few months to several years. By experiencing the outside world, they work temptations out of their systems and prepare themselves for making their most important life decision: The film weaves together interviews with several Amish youths who, to varying degrees, embrace popular youth culture, including smoking, drinking and drug use. Some return to their Amish tradition and are baptized. Others decide against returning, and still others waffle between the options. A caption in the film states the following: This retention rate is the highest ever since the founding of the Amish church in Girls want to join the church at around age 18, but can date in the mean time. Is there anything wrong with the Amish using their young women as bait " or a useful means " to get their young men to join the church? Heaven and hell are as real as New York and Los Angeles. To not question that was so strange to me. An Amish teenager would be considered lost if they would die or be killed during that time. There was always just that fear. But I cope with it I guess. Any kind of questioning or independent thought is beaten out of you. One innovation at a time is slowly allowed in. Several of the youth who returned to their Amish tradition were asked what things they missed the most from their Rumspringa experience. Some of the answers were motor vehicles, clothes, running, music, concerts. Why would these be such great losses? Why might that be? After her rumspringa experience, Velda was baptized into the Amish church, but was shunned after she later decided to leave it. I lost the support of my family. Nobody would talk to me. Why might this be so embarrassing? It was amazing to watch how fast they drank it in. Throughout the film several Amish youth struggle with choosing to either accept or reject their Amish tradition. Do their choices seem free or determined? Because of this, the Amish typically work in manual trades, and those who leave the Amish church are ill-equipped to obtain much better than factory jobs. She contrasted the impersonal assembly line environment there to the warm Amish community barn raising, as depicted in the movie Witness. Have the Amish prostituted their labor as Marx would word it by taking their skills into the non-Amish community? I found the theological content to be very intriguing. While many religious groups endorse some sort of "age of accountability" doctrine, the Old Order Amish have a specific age, sixteen, which seems to be a high estimate for when human beings begin to consciously sin. Rumspringa is when an Amish adolescent, age sixteen, goes to experience the "English" world and, consequently, becomes lost. A part of the rumspringa experience is enjoying the luxuries of technology, but just as important, at least to the adolescents, is enjoying the freedom of copulation and consumption of alcohol. Beyond the theological motifs, the movie raises pertinent ethical questions. For instance, if many of the Amish adolescents will not choose to join the Amish church, and thus be destined to heal, is it morally justifiable to release them out into the world? It seems that the sixteen-years-old Amish would benefit from being thoroughly proselytized and catechized at this age, rather than sent into an English world replete with distractions. A less "religious" but equally troubling ethical question consists in the moral culpability of the Amish parents for the condition of their children. If the Amish did not continue this tradition, then adolescents like Faron would not be pushed into such dangerous situations. The Old Order Amish church has a greater retention rate now than it did throughout much of the twentieth century. Some, however, will decide not to lead an Amish life. The film deals mostly with free will and the afterlife. It takes you through the lives of these teenagers while they experience everything from drugs to driving a vehicle during their Rumspringa. It seems as though several of the teenagers have a hard time deciding whether they want to be baptized into the Amish church or keep their new freedoms in the secular life. One girl was afraid that if she died during her Rumspringa, she would not go to heaven. This would make you think there is a lot of pressure on the youths to return to their home and get baptized into the church as soon as possible, yet that is not the case for many. By ending their Rumspringa and returning to be baptized into the Amish church, they learn to phase out temptation and sin and it prepares them for a life under the Amish laws. I thought the film did a great job of depicting the free will and afterlife issues that the Amish teens dealt with throughout their

Rumspinga.

Amish medical issues Given the closed nature of Amish society, one might suppose that Amish have genetic issues specific to an endogamous community. It is true that Amish have exhibited certain genetic conditions in their society at a higher rate than in non-Amish society. Because of this, Amish, often along with Mennonites who can have similar health issues, have set up clinics with the help of outsiders in order to treat rare medical problems. Etymology[edit] Rumspringa is a Pennsylvania German noun meaning "running around". It is derived from the verb rumspringen. The Standard German term is a compound word of the adverb herum around, about and the verb springen "to jump". The Pennsylvania German noun Rumspringa was derived by contracting the first component of the Standard German term herum to rum â€” a development which is also all but general to spoken standard German â€” and converting the word ending to the Pennsylvania German and general oberdeutsch infinitive form "-a". Popularized view[edit] Amish adolescents may engage in rebellious behavior, resisting or defying parental norms. In many cultures, enforcement may be relaxed, and misbehavior tolerated or overlooked to a degree. A view of rumspringa has emerged in popular culture that this divergence from custom is an accepted part of adolescence or a rite of passage for Amish youth. Among the Amish, however, rumspringa simply refers to adolescence. During that time a certain amount of misbehavior is unsurprising and is not severely condemned for instance, by Meidung or shunning. Adults who have made a permanent and public commitment to the faith would be held to the higher standards of behavior defined in part by the Schleithem and Dordrecht confessions. Amish adolescents do remain, however, under the strict authority of parents who are bound to Ordnung, and there is no period when adolescents are formally released from these rules. A minority of Amish youth do diverge from established customs. Their behavior during this time does not necessarily prevent them from returning for adult baptism into the Amish church. However this proportion varies from community to community, and within a community between more and less acculturated Amish. This figure was significantly lower as recently as the s. Desertion from the Amish community is not a long-term trend, and was more of a problem during the early colonial years. Some Amish communities hold views similar to Old Order Mennonite , and Conservative Mennonites in seeking more productive, spiritual activities for their youth. Some even take up meditation. Far from an open separation from parental ways, the misbehavior of young people during the rumspringa is usually furtive, though often collective this is especially true in smaller and more isolated populations; the larger communities are discussed below. They may or may not mingle with non-Amish in these excursions. Aurand in *The Amish* , along with the reasonable caution that sometimes a blue gate is just a blue gate. There is some opinion that adolescent rebellion tends to be more radical, more institutionalized and therefore in a sense more accepted in the more restrictive communities. The nature of the rumspringa period differs from individual to individual and from community to community. These groups are not necessarily divided across traditional Amish church district boundaries, although they often are. In many smaller communities, Amish youth may have a much more restricted rumspringa, and likewise may be less likely to partake in strong rebellious behavior, as they lack the anonymity of larger communities. Wenger Mennonites youth go through a period of rumspringa between ages 16 and 21, a few years older than the Amish do. They typically do not get into the type of serious offenses of the most "disorderly" of the Amish youth. According to Richard A. Stevick, the novel is a realistic portrayal of the rumspringa of that time. Out of the 5 Amish, only 1 returned to the church to be baptized.
