Summary Many women who use home pregnancy test kits get inaccurate results. Always see your doctor for confirmation of your pregnancy. This is a hormone made by the placenta. If you suspect you could be pregnant, you can see your doctor or family planning clinic for a pregnancy test. The doctor may perform a pregnancy test on your blood or urine. Alternatively, you could buy a home pregnancy test kit, which is available from pharmacists. However, always see your doctor for confirmation of pregnancy if you use a home kit.

Blood pregnancy tests used by doctors Your doctor can give you a blood pregnancy test as early as 11-14 days after ovulation. To perform a blood pregnancy test, the doctor draws blood from a vein in your arm. This blood is sent to a laboratory for testing. The results of most blood pregnancy tests take at least a couple of days. The laboratory then advises the doctor of the result. Blood test results are about 99 per cent accurate and can detect lower amounts of hCG than urine pregnancy tests. The two main types of blood pregnancy test include: **Quantitative blood test** - measures the exact amount of hCG in the blood and can give you an estimate of how far along the pregnancy has progressed. **Qualitative blood test** - only checks for the presence of hCG.

Urine pregnancy tests used by doctors The doctor can give you a urine pregnancy test. You are asked to urinate into a plastic cup or something similar. The doctor then tests the urine using a kit that may look similar to a home pregnancy test kit.

Home pregnancy test kits Home pregnancy test kits are available from pharmacists. However, many women who use home pregnancy test kits get inaccurate results. The most common mistake is to test for pregnancy too soon after the missed period.

How to use a home pregnancy test kit Home pregnancy test kits vary in their sensitivity to hCG. Most test kits are best used about one to two weeks after your period was due. Generally speaking, most home pregnancy tests follow the same basic principles: You collect urine in a small container and dip the test strip into the urine. Alternatively, some kits offer a test strip that you hold under your stream of urine. To improve accuracy of results, it is best to test your urine when you first get out of bed. Early morning urine is concentrated and contains higher levels of hCG than at other times of the day. Most test strips indicate the presence of hCG by the appearance of a coloured line or dot. Most test kits take only a few minutes to complete. Most kits come with a second test strip. This allows you to test again at a later stage.

Sports or athletic activities are the most popular, but at least half of parents say their children ages 6 to 17 have participated in religious instruction, taken music, dance or art lessons, or done volunteer work. About eight-in-ten parents with children younger than 6 also say their children have screen time on a typical day, but fewer say their children spend too much time watching videos or playing games on electronic devices. The survey finds that parents with higher income and higher education generally are more likely to report that their children participate in various activities after school. Meanwhile, these parents tend to worry more about their children doing too much. These findings are consistent with what sociologists have found about parenting approaches among parents of different socioeconomic status. Sports are by far the most popular extracurricular activity for kids in this age group. Religious-based activities are also quite common: Parents with higher income and education are more likely to report that their children participate in various extracurricular activities. A similar pattern is evident across education groups, with college graduates more likely than those with some college or with a high school diploma or less to say their children have participated in extracurricular activities. In addition to sports and arts, children from families with higher income and education are more likely to do volunteer work than other children. Overall, relatively small shares of parents across socioeconomic groups say their school-age children participate in an organization like the scouts, but here, too, participation is more common among families with higher income and education. Teenagers from higher-income families are more likely than their peers to have had some work experience in the year before the survey. Race and ethnicity are linked to participation in some extracurricular activities but not to others. When it comes to athletic activities, there are no significant differences by race: White and black parents are more likely than Hispanic parents to report that their children participated in religious instruction or church youth activities in the 12 months prior to the survey. And black and Hispanic parents are more likely than white parents to say that their children have received tutoring or extra academic help over that period. White parents are more likely than other parents to report that their children did volunteer work, had a part-time job or participated in an organization like the scouts in the 12 months leading up to the survey. For the most part, parents with younger school-age kids are as likely as those with teenagers to say their children participate in extracurricular activities. The exception is volunteering: Parents from different incomes and education, as well as racial and ethnic backgrounds, are equally likely to say they have done that over the same period. Nine-in-ten parents report that their children ages 6 to 17 watch TV, movies or videos on any device on a typical day, and about eight-in-ten say their school-age children play video games. Majorities of about three-quarters or more across racial, education and income groups say their children engage in these activities on a typical day. However, when they do have access, they are more likely to spend more time on these devices. Four-in-ten parents with young children say their kids participate in sports. Organized activities such as sports or lessons in music or arts are less common among younger children. Four-in-ten parents of children ages 5 or younger say their kids participated in sports or athletic activities in the 12 months prior to the survey, and one-in-three parents say their children took music, dance or art lessons over that period. College-educated parents are more likely than parents with lower educational levels to report that their children participate in all three activities asked in the survey. Also, parents with different racial and ethnic backgrounds are equally likely to say that their kids have participated in these three activities. TV, video games are popular among young children. Many seniors get to the point where they are no longer safe behind the wheel. As the owner of a local home care agency, I often see first-hand the problems that occur when these conversations are never held, or go poorly. Let me know if you would like to discuss the subject further with me. That feeling is one of heightened anxiety, of waiting anxious moments until they hear the driver has returned home safely. Telling a parent that he or she needs to stop driving is a conversation that most adult children put off as long as possible. They are not sure what to say or, most importantly, how to say it in a way that would not be insulting and yet have the desired effect of getting them to stop or seriously limit their driving. Are Older Drivers at Risk? In fact, seniors as a group are relatively safe drivers. The actual number of accidents involving older drivers decreases as age increases. Experts attribute this to self-imposed limitations that include driving fewer miles and avoiding problematic situations like driving at night, during rush hour and on high speed roadways. The bad news is that drivers over 75 have a higher risk of being involved in an accident for every mile they drive. The rate of fatalities increases significantly by this age – in fact, it is on par with teenage drivers another sobering thought. So, what can be done? According to AARP, ongoing conversations with family members can help. A survey of older adults found that more than half said they followed the suggestions of others, with women generally more compliant than men. They may prefer to hear it from their spouse or from professionals like their doctor, but will listen to their adult children. The survey found that about one-quarter of all seniors reported responding with sadness when spoken to about their driving. While they may even agree with the assessment, they felt depressed at the thought of relinquishing this activity. After all, the implications are significant – fewer trips outside the home, increased dependency on others, fewer social opportunities, and the fear of becoming a burden to others. Constructing a Game Plan Experts believe that while any discussions on driving are likely to be emotional for family members as well, they should not be put off. They suggest the following: Be prepared to have multiple conversations. Ongoing and candid conversations are recommended in order to establish a pattern of open dialogue and give the older adult time to consider the situation without the strain of necessarily changing behaviors immediately. Start with appropriate conversation openers. Use mishaps or near misses, self-regulation, or health changes as a lead in. For example, praising a senior for choosing to limit her driving to day time or discussing how the taking of a new medication may make them sleepier or less alert should be considered. Observe the senior at the wheel. Seeing, for example, the senior become lost in familiar surroundings may be a sign of dementia and a reason in and of itself to get the senior to stop driving. Studies have shown that people are more willing to listen to those who have driven with them. Investigate the alternatives to driving. Many seniors will see the loss of driving as the loss of independence and a blow to their social network. To make any decision more palatable, it is important to see what other options exist. Is there a bus or train line? Are there friends or relatives who can provide them with a ride? Can the children increase their visits? Discuss your concerns with a doctor. If there is initial resistance, suggest that the older adult be tested for an assessment of their driving skills. These tests are commonly administered by rehabilitation centers, hospitals and VAs. Adult children need to understand that this is more than just the loss of their car, but a clear blow to their freedom and independence. The transition can be a difficult one.

These earthquakes are thought to be caused by the circulation of hot fluids beneath Mount Rainier. Presumably, hot springs and steam vents within Mount Rainier National Park are generated by such fluids. A swarm produced the largest number of events of any swarm at Rainier since seismic monitoring began over two decades earlier. Glaciers are among the most conspicuous and dynamic geologic features on Mount Rainier. They erode the volcanic cone and are important sources of streamflow for several rivers, including some that provide water for hydroelectric power and irrigation. Maximum speeds occur near the surface and along the centerline of the glacier. Flow rates are generally greater in summer than in winter, probably due to the presence of large quantities of meltwater at the glacier base. Many advances of this sort occurred worldwide during this time period known to geologists as the Little Ice Age. Beginning in and continuing through the early s, however, many of the major glaciers advanced in response to relatively cooler temperatures of the mid-century. The Carbon , Cowlitz , Emmons, and Nisqually Glaciers advanced during the late s and early s as a result of high snowfalls during the s and s. Since the earlys, however, many glaciers have been thinning and retreating and some advances have slowed. The South Tahoma Glacier generated 30 floods in the s and early s, and again in August, William Fraser Tolmie explored the area looking for medicinal plants. Hazard Stevens and P. As climbers on this route have access to the permanently established Camp Muir, it sees the significant majority of climbing traffic on the mountain. This route is also the most common commercially guided route. The term "cleaver" is used in the context of a rock ridge that separates two glaciers. The reason for naming this cleaver a "disappointment" is unrecorded, but it is thought to be due to climbers reaching it only to recognize their inability to reach the summit. The Emmons Glacier Route, grade II, is an alternative to the Disappointment Cleaver route and poses a lower technical challenge to climbers. Camp Schurman is equipped with a solar toilet and a ranger hut. The Liberty Ridge Route is a considerably more challenging and objectively dangerous route than the normal route to the summit. Dangers and accidents[edit] About two mountaineering deaths each year occur because of rock and ice fall, avalanche, falls, and hypothermia associated with severe weather. The worst mountaineering accident on Mount Rainier occurred in 1925, when eleven people lost their lives in an ice fall on the Ingraham Glacier. Officials concluded that there was no possible chance of survival after the climbers fell 3,000 feet, 1,000 m while attempting or returning from the summit via the Liberty Ridge climbing route. The bodies of the fourth guest climber and two guides have not been located.

New Illinois Family Law in The new Illinois Family Law in will include limitations on how far a parent can move with a child before they must seek permission from a judge. These limitations are more specific than prior law when it comes to the distance a parent can move. Among the factors considered could include the following: Also under pre law, a parent who had been granted sole custody or primary residential custody of a child would not need to ask permission from the court to relocate to any other part of Illinois, even if it were several hours away. Courts could, however put a reasonable limitation on the distance moved. New Law in Advance Written Notice Required The parent seeking to move with the child will have to send notice in writing to the other parent, stating that he or she intends to move. To send proper written notice, the following requirements must be met: The notice must state the date when the parent intends to move; The notice must list the new address where he or she will be moving; If the move is not permanent, the notice must state the length of time the parent will be living in the new location; The notice must be given to the other parent at least 60 days in advance of the move, unless the court orders otherwise. If such advanced notice would be impracticable, written notice would have to be given at the earliest date practicable. If the non-moving parent agrees with the move, he or she would sign the written notice, the moving parent would file the signed notice with the court, and the move would be allowed without any further court action. If the non-moving parent objects to the move, or does not sign the written notice, the moving parent must file a petition with the court asking for permission to relocate. When Written Notice is Required The parents who must provide written notice of an intent to move include: The parent with whom the child resides the majority of the time Either parent, if the child resides with both of them equal amounts of time The new statute now takes into consideration where the child currently lives, and how far the parent wishes to relocate with the child. A parent would have to provide written notice if he or she wished to move: This changes the pre law in a major way. Under the law prior to , a parent would have to seek permission from the court before relocating across state lines, even if the new home were only a few miles away. Now, a parent does not need to ask for court permission to move with the child across state borders if the new home is within 25 miles of the current home. If one parent moves very far away, it could heavily interfere with the rights of a non-moving parent. This could lead to situations where a custodial parent living near the Illinois border would not be allowed to move to the next town over, but would be allowed to move hundreds of miles away as long as he or she remained within the state. Rather than only dealing with out-of-state moves, the new statute now addresses the issue in more detail by putting specific distance limitations. Genesis 39 â€™Joseph, who was sold into Egypt, serves Potiphar, is falsely accused, and is cast into prison. The word wotteth in Genesis Select the discussion questions and enrichment activities that will best help the children achieve the purpose of the lesson. A Bible for each child. Or for the alternate attention activity draw a simple figure of a person on a piece of paper. Suggested Lesson Development Invite a child to give the opening prayer. Attention Activity Tell the class that the nail, pin, or paper clip represents us. Place it between the two magnets on a flat surface so it can be attracted by one or the other. As you move the metal object toward the magnet representing God, explain that the closer we live to the Lord, the more we are influenced by his goodness. When we seek after good, we are less influenced by that which is evil. Show that as you move the paper farther away from bad influences, it is less affected by them. If we want to remain steadfast and immovable in the face of evil, we should stay away from temptation. You might want to show portions of the video Joseph and His Brothers during the lesson. Discussion and Application Questions Study the following questions and the scripture references as you prepare your lesson. Use the questions you feel will best help the children understand the scriptures and apply the principles in their lives. Reading and discussing the scriptures with the children in class will help them gain personal insights. Why do you think Potiphar trusted Joseph and gave him such responsibility? Note that in verse 8 Joseph Smith translated wotteth as knoweth see footnote b. Fled means that he ran away. What can we do when we are tempted to do wrong? See enrichment activity 1. Even though Joseph was falsely accused and cast into prison, how was he blessed by the Lord? When you are treated unfairly or unjustly punished, what can you do to keep the Spirit of the Lord? After Joseph interpreted these dreams, what favor did he ask in return? What did the chief butler forget? How can we show appreciation to those who help us? Why did the chief butler finally remember Joseph? How much time had passed? What did the chief butler tell Pharaoh? What did Joseph tell Pharaoh about his ability to interpret dreams? To whom should we give credit for our talents, blessings, and spiritual gifts? What solution did Joseph give to help Egypt survive the famine? What do our Church leaders today teach us about food storage? Why is this a good idea? Why did Pharaoh choose Joseph to be in charge of gathering and distributing food? What quality in your character might you use to bless the lives of others? Help the children recognize areas of personal strength. What privilege and power was Joseph given in Egypt? What did Joseph do during the seven years of plenty? Enrichment Activities You may use one or more of the following activities any time during the lesson or as a review, summary, or challenge. Heavenly Father and Jesus Christ know that it is harder to avoid temptation when we allow ourselves to get close to it. Discuss with the children how they could distance themselves from temptation in the following situations: A plate of your favorite dessert is on the table, ready to be taken to a sick neighbor. Your parents have warned you not to swim without someone watching. Whenever you are with them, they dare you to take just one puff. You are troubled by bad thoughts when you read a certain book. You could make a list on the chalkboard of other temptations, such as gossiping, looking at vulgar magazines, using bad language, dressing immodestly, watching inappropriate movies or television shows, telling unclean jokes or stories, listening to improper song lyrics, or using drugs. Discuss strategies for resisting evil, such as removing ourselves from the situation and replacing the temptation with something wholesome. Erase each harmful influence from the chalkboard as it is discussed. Explain that deciding to stay clean and pure before temptation comes can be a protection. Discuss with the children some decisions they can make right now, such as never to smoke; not look at bad books, magazines, television shows, or videos; pray each morning and evening; read the scriptures daily; and stay morally clean. Challenge each child to write down one or more decisions he or she will make now. Explain that instead of concentrating on evils to avoid, we should fill our lives with wholesome influences. Recite the

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thirteenth article of faith with your class and discuss with the children what good things they can seek after in their lives. Challenge the children to commit to being clean and pure. Ask a child to read Psalm Help your class members understand how this scripture could apply to them. Give the children each a pencil and paper and ask them to complete the sentence: Encourage the children to take their papers home and discuss what they have written with their families. Encourage them to stay as far away from temptation as possible. Invite a child to give the closing prayer.
