

As a bass player you will not play bass chords in the same way as a guitar player. Instead you will play bass guitar arpeggios, which are the notes of a chord played individually. Arpeggios for bass guitar are an essential ingredient in creating bass lines.

Any instrument may employ arpeggiation, but the following instruments use arpeggios most often: String instruments are used to play arpeggios in classical music. Bass guitarists often use arpeggios or arpeggiated figures to outline the important notes of chords. Banjo players use arpeggios, which are especially apparent in the Scruggs style three-finger method of playing. Guitarists use arpeggios extensively in certain genres, such as neo-classical , and often while employing the sweep-picking technique. Synthesizers , especially monophonic ones such as the TB , are often called upon to play arpeggios, especially in electronica. Some synths contain automatic arpeggiators especially for this purpose. Keyboards , such as piano and accordions , are often used to play arpeggios, even though they are polyphonic instruments that permit all the notes of a chord to be played at the same time. Arpeggios are an important part of the jazz improvisation vocabulary of horns and keyboards, guitars, and bass. In Western classical music , a chord that is played first with the lowest note and then with successive higher notes joining in is called arpeggiato. Sometimes this effect is reversed, with the highest note coming first. In some modern popular music arpeggiato is called a rolled chord. In early video game music , arpeggios were often the only way to play a chord since sound hardware usually had a very limited number of oscillators, or voices. Instead of tying them all up to play one chord, one channel could be used to play an arpeggio, leaving the rest for drums, bass, or sound effects. However, this technique was rarely used by American and Japanese composers. This is also known as a "pyramid" or "cascade". It is common in barbershop music. The technique originated with jazz big bands and is a staple of trad jazz.

When used properly, the bass guitar can be just as interesting and dynamic as the electric guitar. One of the most interesting concepts in bass is the arpeggio. Arpeggios are simply chords that are played note by note. The easiest way to create an arpeggio is to use a preexisting chord shape. Before we get into arpeggios, it is important that you first assess your skill level. Be sure that you are familiar with basic chords such as triads, basic Major and minor keys, and basic musical intervals. It is important that you understand chord properties, as well as those of keys. Be sure you have a full understanding of how chords are built, as arpeggios are dependent upon the chords from which they are built. Harmony is when two or more voices ring out in unison, creating a single voice. Melody is a linear pattern in either ascending or descending order. If we were to play an A minor scale, to play it is a melody we would play each note in order from either highest to lowest or lowest to highest. Because the pattern is moving in a single direction, it is a linear pattern. As with all concepts, the easiest place to start is in the key of C Major. First off, we will need to build a basic C Major chord. The most basic chord is a triad, and in the key of C Major, a tonic triad consists of the notes C, E, and G. When we play a C Major triad, we are creating harmony. To turn this triad into an arpeggio, we would simply need to play the notes C, E, and G in either ascending or descending order. This may sound fairly simple, and that is because it is; arpeggios are simple, yet impressive when put to proper application. Taking It to a Higher Level The neat thing about arpeggios is that they can be built off of scales. This is why it is important that you have a full understanding of basic keys and musical intervals. To build off of our C Major triad arpeggio, we simply need to choose intervals that will accentuate the arpeggio. For instance, if we play our arpeggio from C to G, then jump a fifth to D, then return to G and descend, we add a richer, fuller and more complete sound to our arpeggio. The best way to add dynamics to an arpeggio is through trial and error. Some notes simply will not sound pleasant. Sometimes arpeggios are best left to their basic notes. These are things that can be assessed through experimentation. Now that you know how to create bass guitar arpeggios, the next step is to try creating your own. Sometimes simplicity is best.
