History and buildings[edit] A view of the main building and lake at Van Mildert College in Van Mildert College was established in following recommendations of the Robbins Report looking into the future of higher education in the UK. In , the University of Newcastle was officially established as a separate entity from the University of Durham, meaning new colleges were required to meet the new university places that the Government wished to create. As a result, the university planned to establish three new colleges on Elvet Hill and these went on to be named Collingwood College , Trevelyan College and Van Mildert College. Female undergraduates were first admitted to the college in , making it the first Durham college to become co-educational. The accommodation blocks are named Tyne, Tees, Middleton, Derwent, Wear, Tunstall and Deerness, the latter two of which are fully en suite. They are all situated within the college grounds and the university is in the process of refurbishing each of the buildings in turn. In total the College can provide single rooms for its members. The hall also acts as a venue for drama productions, has use as a sports hall and in was one of the main locations for the Inter-Varsity Folk Dance Festival. The library is run by a part-time librarian and the library committee of the JCR, which also provides much of the funding to maintain the library. The library has recently undergone a process of automating its catalogue of books. Bar and Junior Common Room[edit] Van Mildert has a recently refurbished bar which is extensively used by members of the college, as well as by students from other colleges. It is also generally used for holding JCR meetings during term time. For example, bops, entertainment after formal dinners , band nights and amateur theatre productions. Both rooms have large plasma screen TVs which are used to show major sporting fixtures during the academic term. The College also has a gym, computer room, shop, tennis court and a full-size snooker table. The college generally uses only the shield of its arms for most purposes. Common Rooms[edit] All members of college are members of a common room. The governance procedure of the JCR is stated in the constitution, which can only be amended by resolution of the JCR members during general meetings. All rooms in this block are en-suite and have access to kitchen facilities due to the fact that postgraduate students are often resident in college outside of normal term times. Postgraduate members of the college are entitled to make use of all the JCR facilities available. Awards for graduating sports players are given at the Annual Sports Formal. The Church University - File: In all but two of the bishops of the Church of England confirmed that they would accept holders of Durham degrees for ordination. In a fundamental statute was passed by the Dean and Chapter, as governors of the University, setting up Convocation and laying down that Durham degrees would only be open to members of the Church of England. Regulations for degrees were finalised in and the university was incorporated by Royal Charter granted by William IV on 1 June as the "Warden, Masters and Scholars of the University of Durham", with the first students graduating a week later. On the accession of Queen Victoria an order of the Queen-in-Council was issued granting the use of Durham Castle previously a palace of the Bishop of Durham to the university. Those attending University College were expected to bring a servant with them to deal with cooking, cleaning and so on. Elsewhere, the university expanded from Durham into Newcastle in when the medical school there established in became a college of the university. During the expansion phase the University also became the first English university to establish relationship with overseas institutions. This may have closed by In , the Durham University Union was established and later revived in , when it took up the name of the Durham Union Society and moved to Palace Green. Medical degrees in Newcastle were exempt from this requirement from the start of the affiliation of the Medical school, but in Durham it lasted until the revision of the statutes in However, "dissenters" were able to attend Durham and then sit the examinations for degrees of the University of London , which were not subject to any religious test. A parliamentary bill proposed in would have fixed the seat of the university in Durham for only ten years, allowing the Senate to choose to move to Newcastle after this. This was blocked by a local MP , with the support of graduates of the Durham colleges, until the bill was modified to establish a federal university with its seat fixed in Durham. This reform also removed the university from the authority of the Dean and Chapter of Durham Cathedral , who had been the governors of the university since its foundation. In the same year, tensions surfaced again over the Durham-Newcastle divide, with a proposal to change the name of the university to the "University of Durham and Newcastle". This motion was defeated in Convocation the assembly of members of the university by votes to The Graduate Society, catering for postgraduate students, was founded in renamed Ustinov College in and the now closed Roman Catholic seminary of Ushaw College , which had been in Durham since , was licensed as a hall of residence in However, Teesside, which had only become a university in , had difficulties in taking on its responsibilities for the college and withdrew in , Durham taking over full responsibility for UCS and the degrees to be awarded there. However, the official name of the institution remains the University of Durham and the official coat of arms is unchanged. This was the first new college to open in Durham itself since the s, at the creation of Collingwood. In the campus cafeteria, "The Waterside Room", was renovated and now serves as the campus student bar. In addition to this facility both colleges at the campus benefit from their own college bars, managed centrally, however, and not by their JCRs.
