

Chapter 1 : Free SAT Practice Tests and Events | The Princeton Review

Taking a full-length SAT practice test is one of the best ways to simulate test day. Eight official SAT practice tests are available for free, both online and on paper.

You are given 65 minutes to complete the section. The passages are presented either individually or paired with another passage. Some of the passages may contain tables, graphs, or charts - but require no math or topic-specific knowledge. The passages will always include: One passage from classic or contemporary literature from the US or worldwide One passage about a social science topic e. Constitution or a speech by a President Two passages or a passage and a passage pair that are science focused, including Earth science, chemistry, physics, or biology. The SAT Reading section attempts to measure the following: Command of Evidence - find evidence that best supports an answer; determine how authors support their claims with evidence; identify relationships between informational graphics and reading passages. You are given 35 minutes to complete this section. This section presents reading passages that contain deliberate errors. You are asked to correct the errors by choosing the best possible replacement. This section still requires a firm grasp of grammar rules including punctuation and common English usage. You are expected to choose words that will improve the tone, style or syntax of the selection. You are expected to select changes to the passages that improve them. The No Calculator section has 20 questions with a 25 minute time limit. The calculator permitted section has 38 questions with a 55 minute time limit. There are two types of questions in the math section - traditional multiple choice and "grid in" questions which require you to determine the answer with selecting from choices. The SAT Math section focuses on the following math topics: Passport to Advanced Math - create and solve quadratic and exponential functions; create equivalent forms of algebraic expressions; add, subtract, and multiply polynomial expressions; understand relationship between zeros and factors of polynomials. SAT Essay The optional SAT essay component will require you to read a passage and write an essay that explains how the author develops a persuasive argument. You are given 50 minutes to complete the essay. Every SAT essay prompt is nearly identical to this example: As you read the passage below, consider how [author] uses evidence, such as facts or examples, to support claims. Be sure that your analysis focuses on the most relevant features of the passage. The SAT topic is different every time, but will always have the following attributes:

Every SAT test contains the same four sections: Some test administrations also include experimental questions, which would extend your total testing time by 20 minutes. How many times can you take the SAT? You can take the SAT as many times as you want, but most students take the test 2 or 3 times. We recommend taking the PSAT or a practice test your sophomore year. Plan ahead to take the official SAT in spring or winter of junior year. If you are unhappy with your score, that leaves you time to prep and take it again before application deadlines. Because the SAT is a paper test (as opposed to a computer test), it's best to take the practice tests on paper. Also, make sure you do your scratch work directly on the test. Don't get out separate pieces of scratch paper to use since on the actual test you won't get any scratch paper (but will be allowed to take notes directly in your test).

But before you do, make sure you have the right mindset and strategies to approach each exam, utilizing each one to its maximum potential. Dedicate a reasonable amount of time such as hours a day, or even 30 minutes if that is reasonable to you. Keep track and pay attention to your scores. Treat the Practice Exams like the real thing. You should try to treat each exam like the real deal to experience the timing and determine whether you get test fatigue. Here is what I recommend: Find a location where you will not be distracted. My favorite spot is the local library. Bring some snacks and a water bottle. Start a snack routine! Here is a technique I find that works extraordinarily well: First, use the answer key and mark every question you got wrong. Come back to the questions you missed and try to answer them again. See if you made any silly mistakes or if you missed a section while reading. Grade yourself again with your new answers. The goal is to determine whether you: Never learned the content before. Always ask yourself questions as you review the materials. What is this question asking for? The more questions you ask, the more self-aware you are as you look over the exams. You need to discover your own strengths and weaknesses, and determine how to proceed. Advanced Techniques Working through the exams, you should be able to identify your own baseline and figure out how to proceed from there. Using the basic review guidelines I set up there, you should see a steady improvement as you go over each exam. If not, you should take a step back and figure out what the problem is. If you feel like that is not challenging enough for you, check out my additional tips and try some out: Make quick marks as you go over each question, and refer back to them as you review. I like this system of markings "€"? Sometimes we tend to overlook lucky guesses. Identify each English convention as you go over writing. Also pay attention to the flow and tone of the paragraphs. This helps especially in identifying shifts in ideas. I like to use smiley faces and drawings to remind me of the content. For Math, try to break down each question and rebuild it. What is the underlying concept? How many different ways can you ask a similar question? Getting a higher score At the end of the day, it really comes down to two things to achieve that higher score, whether it is or But is it likely? Be honest with yourself, what is the score you really want, and are you willing to put in effort to reach it? Nobody is born knowing all of the trig identities, however certain qualities will help you become better. High achievers are not afraid of failure when getting a question wrong. They will push through and try and understand their mistakes and move forward. High achievers are driven to achieve their goals. They focus on what they want and put out the appropriate time and effort to get there. I always recommend a full dinner the night before a test, followed by a good hours of sleep and a big breakfast the morning of. Taking more practice exams also helps overcome the test fatigue. My personal favorite is bringing a large bottle of Powerade and having a supply of bananas on hand. Remember to study smart, not hard. Studying hard is rewriting every question and answer without understanding why or how. Studying smart is asking why you got a question wrong, what the question is looking for, and diving deeper into understanding the underlying foundations and content of the question. Also work with the best possible practice content, for you. Not all material are equal, and similarly, expensive does not mean better quality. It is definitely a good place to start, and at least supplement your review. Why would anybody sign up for SAT review classes or buy additional course books if the material is available to everybody for free? Some self-motivated individuals may do very well in the class, and good for them! However if you are like most students, structure and planned lessons are key.
