Consider requesting a letter from the organization stating the amount collected and its intended use, so that you can share it with volunteers and others. Sincerely thank all the volunteers for their time and effort: Inform them of the final donation amount provided to the community program, and what that will achieve for this important cause. Ask the community program coordinator for stories about the project your donation funded, so you can share it with the volunteers and your community through the media in the coming weeks and months. While the program is still fresh in your mind, develop a list of lessons learned so you can implement any modifications in the future. Here is how to make your used book sale a positive experience: Designate a table for the check-out area and gather your cashier supplies. Make large price signs for the check-out area and provide sales tax price tables, if needed Review security measures for the cash box. For example, the cash box may be most secure on a table behind the volunteers and the check-out table. Make sure there is adequate space for two lines to form during busy times. The collected money should be placed in a locked, secure place or carried in a waist pack worn by the volunteer banker. Design your check-out system to accommodate shoppers quickly. During peak hours, recruit an assistant cashier to call out prices, bag purchases and assist your shoppers. You may want to have an organization stamp to speed up check writing. Deposit proceeds in the bank or a safe place. Remember to check with your state or local tax authority to determine if the used book sale is exempt from sales tax or not. The local press welcomes information about community events. Many radio and TV stations and news outlets offer online forms to simplify event promotion. The best time to send media announcements are Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Publicizing the Sale Before and After Use a promotional flyer. Ask permission to display flyers, posters or postcards at coffee shops, local libraries, malls and local businesses. Invite local businesses to participate with you as volunteers or co-sponsors. The reporters most interested in your announcement will be community editors. Solicit volunteers who can help develop a local media list of editors and reporters with their names, phone numbers and email addresses. Most newspapers and radio and television stations will list newsroom contact information on their websites. E-mail basic details of the event, using plain text without any fancy graphics. The e-mail should include: Follow up with reporters several days after the event to announce the total number of books purchased and the approximate number of visitors you had to your sale, as well as the amount of money raised, and what that amount of money is expected to purchase. Send this information to the same media list.

Items that fall into the category of "ephemera" include postcards, advertisements, movie and other posters, playbills, maps, historical documents, product labels and packages, and many more items. Fill out a brief questionnaire about the condition of your book, and then Amazon will give you a shipping label. But I hate the idea of throwing anything remotely usable into a landfill. You can donate old books to a variety of places, while also receiving tax deductions for charitable contributions. Best of all, your unwanted pile of books can help others who enjoy reading as much as you do.

**Where to Donate Books Locally** Donating your used books locally saves you the shipping costs of mailing your books and benefits charities and needy families in your area. You can donate books at a variety of locations in your community, including:

- The Salvation Army** The Salvation Army accepts used goods donations, including hardback and paperback books. You can find drop-off locations in your community on the Salvation Army website.
- Goodwill** Goodwill accepts used book donations for their resale stores. Proceeds from the stores fund job training and placement programs for those who face unemployment challenges, such as the disabled. You can find a drop-off location near you on the Goodwill website.
- Libraries** Most libraries have a Friends of the Library Society. These societies hold book sales and other fundraisers to benefit the libraries. The groups use donated books to stock library shelves or resell the books at fundraising events. Typically, library societies accept like-new and gently used book donations.
- Local Thrift Stores** Local second hand thrift stores can use your donated books. However, you may want to donate your books to these stores just to increase the availability of affordable books in your community.
- Fundraisers** If you have an idea for a fundraiser and a few friends with piles of unwanted books, you can start your own book drive. The group purchases your used books and cuts you a check, which you can give to the charity of your choice.
- Reading Tree** Reading Tree has book donation centers throughout the U. The charity collects used books and donates them to underfunded libraries and schools, both in the U.
- Where to Ship Your Books** While you have to pay for the cost of shipping, these charities work for really cool causes: **Books for Soldiers** With Books for Soldiers , you can create care packages with your used books and send them to deployed soldiers overseas. Some soldiers request specific books or types of books, but most just ask for anything. **Books for Africa** Books For Africa sends freight containers full of thousands of books to students in Africa. The charity looks for reference books and recent textbooks, both primary and secondary educational levels, but you can also send fiction and nonfiction books. Having access to reading material helps prisoners who aspire to higher education and helps them adjust to outside life at the end of their sentences. You can find a list of the most wanted materials on the **Books Through Bars** website. The list includes dictionaries, Spanish books, study guides, textbooks, history books, drug and alcohol recovery books, and spiritual books. Paperbacks are preferred since most prisons do not allow hardcover books. The proceeds go toward funding the **Association of Library Trustees, Advocates, Friends and Foundations**, a charitable organization that supports public libraries. Every charity needs certain types of books, and you may have to donate to more than one organization to get rid of your entire stash. If you donate your books, get a receipt and keep track of which books you donate, as well as their condition, for tax purposes. While you do not need to submit the receipts to the IRS, it is wise to retain them to determine the size of the donations tax deduction you can claim. Instead, use the ruler in Word under the View menu or the paragraph settings under the Home menu to adjust your tabs. A half inch is standard. Despite what most of us were taught in school, the standard is now one space after periods, not two. Finally, use the page break option to break for a new chapter, not enter or a million spaces.
