Finished the title story last night - most excellent and WAY ahead of its times. This long story was published in Schmitz deserves a wider readership. Again - seems WAY ahead of its time in its level of sophistication and style. I like the Bradbury-esque title too. The ending is heart-warming, despite all the killing that has taken place in the story. "The Custodians" - A more routine drama and set much closer to home Earth and much closer to "our" time. Not as much humor either. No actual violence in this one although it does exist in the minds of several characters as a solution to certain problems. It is kind of enigmatic. Probably not a strength of the author and that goes for MANY sci-fi writers. The rest of it is fine if a bit less "original" than the Vega tales. The setting, as in the previous tale, is closer to our time and also deals with the problem of how to get way far away from Earth. Three stories to go! Interesting to be reading this in the midst of reading "Oryx and Crake" as both concern genetic manipulation. The ending is wry and romantic. Not a lot of romance in sci-fi Typical for sci-fi grade A ideas expressed in only adequate prose. This story is also set fairly close to "home" time-wise - A. The editors forgot to delete the smoking from this one. Greenface - Straight out of "Creature Features"! A well-crafted and implacable monster done in by resourceful humans in a close call. The dialogue is pretty corny and sort-of typical for the genre and author. Rogue Psi - A bit unusual as the denouement is mostly described by one person to a couple of others rather than by the author as it unfolds. Another near-future story with the smoking unedited out.

Looking at life as an outsider and feeling as though one is being treated as an outsider is a matter of perspective or point of view. Someone who always feels like an outsider may conclude that life is unfair. Adolescence is a time when teenagers may consider themselves to be adults, but in reality teens are still under the control of others. Parents, teachers, and other authority figures are always telling them how to live their lives. For example, Ponyboy knows that he is not safe walking the streets in his own neighborhood. He could be attacked solely because of the way he is dressed; he feels like an outsider in his own town. His feelings of powerlessness and vulnerability lead him to conclude that life is not fair. Ponyboy sees injustice on a daily basis. His parents are dead, Darry is forced to work two jobs to support the brothers, Soda has dropped out of school, and the greasers are looked upon as "white trash. Because he is from the poor, East Side of town, his place in life is unfairly predetermined. The evolution of the family relationships is a recurrent theme in the novel. Family relationships are strained during the teen years, but in the Curtis family, the right to stay together as a family is a constant struggle. Since the death of their parents, Darry has assumed the responsibility of guardianship for Pony and Soda, and under that pressure he has aged beyond his years. He no longer views the two boys as siblings, but rather as a responsibility. He is self-conscious about the fact that Soda has dropped out of school, and he wants him to finish his education. Soda did not do well in school, did not like school, and is perfectly content to work in a gas station " a job he loves. Soda also believes that he is doing the right thing by helping to support his family. Gang relationships are included in the theme of family love. The home life situations that these boys find themselves in are often abusive. They have turned to the gang for the love and support that should have come from parents. Johnny is painfully aware of the difference between the gang and a family and through him Pony begins to understand how lucky he is to have caring family members: I thought about it for a minute " Darry and Sodapop were my brothers and I loved both of them. The third major theme that runs through *The Outsiders* is the use of colors in a black and white world. Adolescents have a tendency to embrace people and events as absolutes. For example, someone or something is either right or wrong; there can be no middle ground. The characters in *The Outsiders* are either Socs or greasers. People are either rich or poor, good or bad. Hinton descriptively uses color throughout the book to define and add depth to the characters in their environments. Early in the book, she associates warm colors with the Socs and cool colors with the greasers. The greasers view the Socs as insiders and themselves as outsiders. Using many descriptive colors, Hinton paints the greasers as outsiders. Dally is the exception to the rule, "His hair was almost white it was so blond. White is also used many times throughout the novel to describe fright, "white as a ghost. To realize that people and events may not be purely right or wrong, good or bad, can be frightening. Dally appears to be the stereotypical hood: But he is not that extreme persona. Throughout the book, Pony matures and grows in his ability to see the full spectrum, to stop dividing the world into black and white, good and bad, insiders and outsiders, greasers and Socs. A sub-theme within this story is the power of three. Three is a cardinal number that is common in American literature and folklore, and to find it as a pivotal theme in this story is not surprising. The Holy Trinity is a major doctrine of the Christian faith. The three Curtis brothers working together have the power to save their family. Illusions are something we believe we see, but they are not real. When it comes to the illusions that limit our lives, they are the product of an unconscious relationship we have with images of past events stored away in our own minds and hearts that condition the way in which we experience our lives. These illusions -- our unsuspected relationship with them, and the conditions they create in our lives -- do not serve us. They serve the interest of the society from which these images and their illusions have sprung. The life of illusion is the story of humankind, and its deception grows stronger every day -- causing most people to fall into a deeper and deeper spiritual slumber. As a result, individuals are no longer in command of their own lives. They are ruled by their habitual reactions to events that run counter to the images of security, happiness, etc. Then, our mind forms an image of this conspiracy based on some usually painful experience of a similar past event, and we are gone! We find ourselves the captive of our own idea about what is happening, followed by those negative emotional reactions that then rule us and wreck the rest of our relationships. And, when we mechanically fight with these negative effects, we strengthen that which produces those illusions; so that instead of getting to the heart of the illusion, and canceling it at its core -- which is the only chance we have to be free -- we actually participate in making ourselves prisoners of further illusion. Yet, to be able to see the truth of this negative spiral is a highly positive thing for us. It awakens in us the real need to free ourselves of the false self that is the king of illusions! Real spiritual work, real spiritual development is not the sense of pleasure that comes when we imagine ourselves being free or new. Real spiritual work is seeing through the need to imagine who we are at all. And as we realize this truth, and do the interior work to give up that image-dependent self, we also let go of its principle illusion: How is it that we are deceived by illusions created by our own minds? How do we put a stop to it? When you go see a performing illusionist, and he is manipulating the conditions, the scenery, and you participate in what he does -- knowing that he can make your mind see certain things -- then you are taking part in the illusion. For an illusion to take place, there has to be two parties involved. One is outside of you: The other is within you, the "self" that is deceived by the illusion through having "cooperated" with the fun in that deception. But who, or what, is the "illusionist" living inside of us? This is "a horse of a different color"! Have there have been times in your life when you were absolutely sure, beyond a shadow of a doubt, that what you were thinking about, going through, was real beyond any question? Have you ever gone into a sheer panic because you lost your keys? In the moment where you lose something, do you think that the anxiety and the fear are proportionate to the loss of the key? Or is there something much greater going on? Have you ever judged someone incorrectly? You look and you know. You know everything about that person. Now, what is it at work within us that creates the image, and -- more important to the whole of our discussion -- who is it that believes that what is illusory is real? But, within us, "who" is the illusionist? And "who" is being deluded? To know this, even sense its truth, begins to set us free. The next time you catch yourself going into the past and reliving some regret, fearing the future, or painfully judging other people, know that this condition that has you temporarily captive is nothing but the work of the "illusionist. This self-righteous self -- that knows that the other person is all wrong -- is the work of the "illusionist. We drop our relationship with the parts of us that would punish another even as it punishes us. The only thing we do is see that the "illusionist" has been having its way within us, and we end our relationship with it on the spot! Because the Light exists! You will
