This section provides detailed information about how entries are laid out, including definitions for symbols used and the names of agencies cited by their abbreviations in the alphabetical listing. It also offers some general guidelines for the transcription of drugs. Following this introduction is the main section of this reference, which is laid out alphabetically. Drug names are in bold print, with brand or trade names capitalized; generics begin with lower case letters. If a drug is a brand and a generic, both spellings are included. Foreign spellings are cross-referenced with American spellings. Items beginning with a number or a single letter are listed alphabetically, ignoring the initial number or letter; for example, 5-FU is under "F" and D-thyroxine is under "T". In addition to brand and generic drugs, the alphabetical list contains medicinal herbs, chemotherapy protocols, test kits, imaging agents, wound dressings and trademarked terms describing how drugs are administered. Both brand and generic listings include information on what the drug is used for, how it is dispensed and dosages available. A listing may also include the agency or agencies that approved the drug, alternate spellings, if the drug is available over-the-counter, and sound-alike information, as well as cross references to an official name, a current name for an older generic name no longer used, or other names used for the same item. Notes are included for discontinued items, including the year, as well as name changes. The final section of this book contains the appendices; all are alphabetical. Appendix A is a listing of sound-alikes. In the main section, these drugs will have an "ear" icon. Appendix B lists abbreviations and their meanings. Appendix C provides therapeutic drug levels. Appendix D is a list of the most prescribed drugs and their uses. It contains five alphabetical sections, each of which is highlighted along the right edge of the page. Section 1 lists generic drugs with all corresponding brand names. Section 2 is a list of drugs by use, such as anticoagulants and immunosuppressants. Some categories are divided into subcategories and may include references to other sections. For example, "Antihistamines" are listed as systemic or topical with cross-references to other listings, while "Antidepressants" has a cross reference to "Psychotherapeutics, Antidepressants" with no medications listed. Substances still in the testing phase are indicated by a "generic not yet assigned" designation. Section 4 translates street drug slang into pharmaceutical names, many of which are cross referenced to the Pharmaceutical Word Book. This feature could be somewhat cumbersome. I believe this is a minor issue and would recommend listings similar to Section 1 in future editions, i. Section 5 provides detailed information on hazardous materials. Included in this listing are the names of the materials, the hazard category or categories, and the possible adverse effects associated with contact with these substances. Each of these references is a gold mine of easy-to-use, well-organized information. When used together, they are a powerhouse in the continuing challenge to keep pace with the ever-changing world of pharmaceuticals. I have used these references for several months now and would not be without either of them. In my opinion, the only way to improve this set would be to make available on CD-ROM with quarterly or semi-annual update subscriptions. I was pleased to discover on visiting the W.
