We knew it could very well turn out to be the clash of the titans. Chanting que sera sera, we boarded our flight to Port Blair from Chennai. Little did we know what was in store. Done with Corbyn beach and the light-and-sound show at the Cellular Jail on the very first day, we trooped off for a visit to Ross Island the next day, only to return dejected due to the choppy waters. We were still blissfully unaware of the storm that was brewing. The group was upset over the cancelled visit, and grumpily boarded the cruise ferry for Havelock Island. That place was paradise! After checking into our resort, we made a beeline to the lovely beach, where I thought I would spend the rest of my stay. December 5 was a good day. The family went diving, sea-walking, and checking out other beaches. I spent the day just staring at the ocean and sipping cocktails, happiness all around. The next day we were to go to Neil Island, and I was dreading the ferry ride and praying that I get out of it somehow. My wish did come true, and how! Winds picked up from the night of December 5 and a storm warning came early morning on December 6. We were told that no boats would ply that day, as the sea was disturbed. After all, Neil Island could not be that different from Havelock and I was as it is ecstatic where I was. The only thing was that there was no network to make calls and not even wi-fi for Internet access. So getting information in or out was difficult. But we were still on schedule, so no one would miss us. We could just catch a boat direct to Port Blair the next day. But the next day we heard about Vardah, and the prospect of having to stay in Havelock longer. The other guests were getting worried "they had things to do at home, prior commitments, worried family, and additional expenses that came with an extended stay. I on the other hand love storms. I love the power they have. I find it amazing to stand against the wind and the rain" and Vardah was delivering. We had a couple in the cabin next to ours with a year-old-baby. They were soaked trying to get food and the man promptly fell ill. We lent them one of our umbrellas. The pathways were waterlogged and one person got a bad cut from a stray wire. He soon had a foot infection and there was no doctor to access. Resorts had shut down power supply during the day as they were running short of generator fuel. Food was set menu only as supplies were running out. Added to this, the uncertainty was getting to people, and most of the guests were sitting in the reception area trying to get some news. Tempers were running high as packages expired and hotels started charging rack rates. Having nothing to do and no means of communication only heightened anxiety levels. It was a study in human behaviour and organisational response. And then something amazing happened. They put the adversity aside and connected. The system rallied too. Resort managers and travel agents did a phenomenal job of crisis management. They kept us informed of developments, they asked for help, they reassured people, and they agreed to deferred payments; we could get back home and transfer money. Finally, on December 9 the weather cleared and we rushed to be rescued. But it was mayhem with little order or process. Foreigners were taken out first at the cost of Indians who could have still caught their flights, and many people were angry at being treated as second-class citizens in their own country. Imagine our faces when we reached the airport on December 12, only to be told that Vardah had got there before us and no flights would take off. But that is another story.

Down to bad luck and poor organisation on behalf of the Indian government we missed the opportunity to extend our visas by 15 days, which had been done by loads of our friends and we were told when we got our permits by immigration. The guide book said it was horrible, and it was. The main city in the Andamans, and the only place with a large port and an airport. If you come to the Andamans, unfortunately, you have to go to Port Blair. We stayed in the cheapest place listed in the guide book, Hotel Lalaji Bay View. That afternoon we went to check out Ross Island just 10 minutes sail from Port Blair. The guide book described it as an Ankor Wat type place with colonial buildings instead of an ancient temple. Really cool little island, I think we paid 30rs each to get in and you can just roam around as you please. In some cases you can see where a tree has grown around a building and knocked it over, the trunks of the trees still in the shape of the former building. If you wait until everyone off the boat has gone you can get a tuk-tuk cheaper. Before I got to Havelock, for me, there was no way a beach could be as beautiful as the mountains. I cannot describe it! The water was as clear as And as warm as a bath in the afternoon. Coconut trees lining all along the beach, along with some normal looking trees that hung out over the beach and met the water. When the tide came in it reached the trunks of the trees. Words cannot describe the beauty, all I can say is it was perfect. Imagine paradise island, that beach you have in your head was our beach for a month! We moved into Sunrise a few days later, little beach huts rs per night. A double between three again, oh well. We even had our own pat rat living under the hut, a fine establishment. Two of the best friends I made on Havelock were Leggy and Maximus, two of the dogs living at sunrise. He clearly used to be the alpha dog! Despite the fact he dragged his arse along the floor everywhere to get around, he never backed down from a fight with another dog however late he might arrive. He had a dislike for some Indians and watching him chase them up and down the beach all day was hilarious. Maximus was the new alpha, but clearly had great respect for Leggy as the former leader. Whenever someone kicked off with Leggy, Maximus was on hand to F them up! Anything you could need for a party can be acquired. You have an amazing view of Sunrise, truly stunning! Another thing that cannot be described it was so beautiful. Due to the fact they use the same time as India but technically being in another time zone the sun rises really early and sets really early. On some nights you can see a moon rise! Beach 7 is a very close second or joint first beach! It takes around half an hours nice drive there from 5. Which makes it easy to get away from the mayhem to a peaceful spot to chill. The forest just behind the beach is class, the trees are incredible. Although it had never happened before then or since. Throughout the day the area is filled with divers, dive boats and snorkellers. Again though, it was incredible beautiful. Elephant beach is the only beach on the island with lasting damage of the Tsunami which ripped through the island. Great trees, and I mean great! As thick and as tall as you can imagine lying, uprooted on the beach! You drive halfway to 7 and then pull up and have to walk the rest of the way in the blistering heat! Being on a tight budget we knew it was too expensive though. To be honest the thought to go diving had never even crossed my mind for some reason, I thought it was something unreachable I suppose. So when we eventually move into Sunrise all our friends, basically everyone is urging us to do the open water course, telling us how amazing it is etc. Koh Pan-gnan, Thailand is renowned for being the cheapest place in the world to go do your diving courses. Even with my very little experience diving I can tell you that diving with more people takes away from the experience slightly. On the second day we got into the water, we spent the first half of the day in neck deep water learning some basic skills, buoyancy, clearing the mask underwater, taking the mask off and replacing It etc. In that afternoon we did our first dive, just around the area in Nemo reef for snorkelling to practise the skills. To be honest I was concentrating more on not dying than looking at fish at first anyway.

Turns out me and Dave were really easy students! We did a second dive that afternoon which was even better than the first! The day after we did another two dives, both of which we went out on the boat to get to instead of doing a land entry from 2 and diving at Nemo. When we dropped anchor you could see to the bottom and it was around 10M deep! We dived here and Viggie our instructor was pointing out cool fish, none of which I can remember the names of. We saw a stingray on that dive at least! Only a small one, but still incredible! Laila, our German friend, also came on the dive with us. The boat was leaving at 6. Coming along for the dive were three Indians from Mumbai. Two girls around my age and one of their dads. It was exactly what I wanted. Words cannot describe the feeling of that dive! All different colours, swimming in different directions, really close to us, surrounded by fish just a few feet away from my face. I would recommend everyone try it! Unfortunately you only get a 30 day permit when you enter Andamans, we were told it could be extended by an extra 15 days when we arrived, and had heard of people doing it. You can understand our disappointment when we get back to Port Blair to get the extension and our ticket back to the mainland, the extensions have been stopped and the ship is fully booked! After lots of pleading and a couple of white lies we had ourselves a five day extension and a flight. The flight cost rs, so a little more than the rs we were expecting to spend! We returned to Havelock to live out the final five days in paradise, and got the same beach hut. Still though, at least we have the rest of our trip to look forward to, some people have gone directly home from Andamans! We arrived back in Channai! For me Mysore, Gorkarna, Pune.

The ship was refitted in Gibraltar between 19 October and 13 November and required repairs between 16 April and 6 May after hitting the stone side of a quay. Havock was given a brief refit at Sheerness Dockyard between 15 and 26 August before returning to Gibraltar. She was transferred back to the UK in November for a more thorough refit at Sheerness between 18 December and 23 March In the meantime, the 2nd Destroyer Flotilla had been assigned to the Home Fleet and Havock rejoined them when her refit was finished. The mines were laid on the early morning of 8 April, before the Germans began their invasion, and the destroyers joined the battlecruiser Renown and her escorts. The flotilla leader Hardy led four of her half-sisters down Ofotfjord in a surprise dawn attack on Narvik harbour during a blinding snowstorm. Hotspur and Hostile were initially left at the entrance, but Havock was third into the harbour and fired five of her torpedoes into the mass of shipping. As the British ships were withdrawing, they encountered five German destroyers at close range. Two of the German ships crossed the T of the British ships and quickly set Hardy on fire and forced her to run aground. Havock was next in line and fired torpedoes at the German destroyers, but they all missed. She was hit in return, but not significantly damaged. In the confusion and limited visibility, Havock pulled out of the line to find out what happened to Hardy and to protect the rear of the British formation from the other three German destroyers in pursuit, but then had to then to turn again to allow her rear guns to fire when her forward guns failed. Havock and Hostile turned back to protect their badly damaged sister, Hotspur, and all three continued to withdraw down the Ofotfjord. En route, they encountered the German supply ship Rauenfels, loaded with artillery and ammunition, whose crew ran her aground and abandoned ship after Hostile fired at the ship. A boarding party from Havock found the ship on fire and she blew up after the ship fired two shells into her. She rescued survivors from the sunken ferry Prinses Juliana off the Dutch coast and returned them to the Hook of Holland where she recovered a number of British demolition parties. On 16 May, the ship was ordered to reinforce the Mediterranean Fleet at Malta and was assigned to the 2nd Destroyer Flotilla. Her boiler room was flooded after an attack by Italian aircraft after this battle and she was repaired at Suez from 29 July to 15 September. She was under repair at Alexandria until 16 June. Havock was under repair from 21 October to 4 December at Alexandria. Havock escorted the badly damaged light cruiser Aurora back to Malta. Havock rescued some survivors before Thermopylae sank. Havock ran aground off Kelibia , Tunisia, in the Strait of Sicily on 6 April and was wrecked, with one crewman killed in the incident. Her crew and passengers were interned by the Vichy French at Laghouat in the Sahara but were released in November as a result of Operation Torch.

There are more than 50 resorts at Havelock and the most sought after is the Dolphin Resort, run by Tourism Department. The Tourism Department put up domes during the tourist season at Radhanagar beach. It is about 12 kilometers from the Islands ferry pier. Radhanagar is a Grade A beach of outstanding quality. It has an overall length of two kilometers and an average width of 30 to 40 meters. The sand is white and very fine in grain. The beach has a gentle gradient of around 1: Most of the beach is lined by mahua trees, whose trunks grow along the ground for many feet before they begin to climb vertically. These trees have lent a distinct character to the sea front and provide shade, close to the water. Vijaynagar Beach is perfect for long walks along the sea. Private ferry operators organize tours to Elephant beach from Havelock. Kalapather Beach Kalapather Beach Sun rise at Havelock Island This beautiful silver sandy beach located 12 km from Havelock jetty is slowly gaining visitors footfall, though proper facilities are yet to be established. Beach-combing, sunbathing, scuba diving, seawalk, snorkeling, watersports, surf riding, swimming, game fishing, watching the sunset or sunrise, elephant ride, bird-watching, trekking, sailing, kayaking and many more.
