The Wildcats are a diverse crew in age, ability, and background, and each player is described in detail as Tom sees them. In the beginning of the story, Tom struggles with feeling confident, especially when playing baseball or talking to others. What advice would you give to Tom to help him with these struggles? Tom is a private boy who is most comfortable keeping his thoughts to himself, writing them in his notebook p. He spends a lot of time fantasizing about being a star baseball player or a winning speaker. Evaluate the handling of the game of baseball in this book. Is there a culture of baseball? If so, does it have its own separate social rules, vocabulary, value system? How would you describe it? Descriptions of the game of baseball in this novel are infused with religious language. For example, Doc Altenheimer actually refers to the upcoming baseball game as a means for God to enact his will upon the town of Dillontown p. The future of the town depends on the game. Also, Daisy Ramirez tells the Dillontown team, "You represent the history and spirit of this town" p. Baseball has symbolic and spiritual importance to the destiny of the entire town and each of its players. What do you think the title of this book means? Who is "the boy who saved baseball," and how do you know? The opening page of the novel names

Cruz de la Cruz as the boy who saved baseball. Some readers might say that Cruz is given credit because of the confidence he helped instill in Tom and the other members of the Wildcats. Other readers might see Tom as the savior of baseball, because his inheritance from Doc Altenheimer makes it possible for Dillontown to maintain its values and identity. What are some of the lessons that Tom learns through the course of this book about baseball, about himself, or about life? Tom learns from Del Gato that there is no magic secret to success in baseball. He learns to trust his abilities and judgment, in baseball as well as in other aspects of life. He grows more confident. He learns to speak up when necessary, instead of being silent, and he learns that others believe in him, too. What kind of person does Dante Del Gato turn out to be in the end? Does he change through the course of the story, or does Tom just begin to know him better? Del Gato is grumpy all through the story, but he turns out to be a man who truly cares about the future of the town of Dillontown. And Tom begins to realize that his crabbiness is "nothing more than armor". On the day of the big game, Del Gato explains his past to Tom, and confesses his regrets about quitting the Padres and his old habit of drinking too much. He also thanks Tom and his family for "breaking down my wall" by involving him in the Big Game. How would you define the word "hero"? Is a person a hero if no one knows or witnesses what the person did? Have you ever thought someone was called a hero without justification—that is, to you the person was no hero? In responding to this question, students will probably discuss Cruz de la Cruz, who played an important role in "saving" Dillontown, even though he missed the final game. This list includes only verified supercentenarians, leaving out claims like Shirali Muslim although he is a bonus item. However there are a few disputed claims that do have some proof. So here they are in order from youngest to oldest. She lived in Kagoshima and celebrated her th birthday a month before her death from pneumonia. Hongo was born on the small island of Tokunoshima, she later moved to Kagoshima where she lived with her daughter. She became a minor celebrity and was a focus of some merchandise including wash-cloths, key-rings, phone cards and more imagine how stylish a shirt with a wrinkled great grandmother on it would look. Hongo was 58 years old when World War II ended. Kyushu, where Kagoshima is located is home to several other age record holders, making it an island of longevity, much like Okinawa. White November 18th â€” February 14th Age: White was recognized by Guinness world records as the oldest person in the world at around the time of her th birthday in Carrie was a resident of Palatka, Florida nursing home. She was in a nursing home not because of age, but due to a nervous breakdown in , which left her institutionalized. And yes, she is another one from the United States. In fact, the US has more supercentenarians than any country in the world. They are not considered a land of longevity though due to the number per capita. Elizabeth Bolden was one of only seven people worldwide that lived until age Her birth was the last remaining documented birth of Elizabeth Jones later Bolden was born in Somerville Tennessee, the daughter of freed slaves. Lizzie married Lewis Bolden circa and their first child, a son named Ezell, was born on September 21st She had seven children in total, only two of whom were still alive at the time of her death in However a few lower down on this list reveal some of their secrets. She is also the oldest undisputed person since the Koseki system in Tane Ikai outlived her daughter and her three sons. Ikai moved to a retirement home in at age 93 where she enjoyed sewing and pottery until she had a stroke at age She also suffered a stroke at age and was bed-ridden ever since. She survived on three meals of rice gruel a day mmm yummy, I promise there are better supercentenarian diets lower on this list. She died at age and days of kidney failure. Her body was the first of a supercentenarian known to be autopsied. She was the oldest documented person to have lived in three centuries. Maria was the daughter of a colonel and lived a life in the upper-class elite. She attended social functions and art classes. She never smoked or drank hard liquor, unlike others on this list. At age Capovilla nearly died and was given last rites, but has been reasonably free of health problems since then until her death. At age she was said to be in good health and was able to watch TV, read newspapers and walk without the aid of a cane. She had also stopped talking and was only able to walk with the help of two people. Still she was able to sit upright in a chair and was said to be doing fine. She died of Pneumonia just 18 days before her th birthday. She is still the oldest ever Canadian. By the time she died of a blood clot at age , her son was already in the same nursing home and her oldest living daughter was 90 years old. Now that would make you feel old, a 90 year old daughter. Hannah is the oldest African American to have ever lived and the oldest American at the time of her death. She died 33 hours before the year Sarah Knauss lived her entire life in Pennsylvania. She was born in a small coal-mining town called Hollywood. Knauss was a homemaker and insurance office manager. Her daughter, who was 96 at the time of her death and lived to be herself, said she was a very tranquil and peaceful person. She said nothing fazed her mother. In she was asked if she enjoyed her long life. Her answer was that she enjoyed it because she had her health and could still do

many things into old age. Her interests were needlepoint, watching televised golf and eating chocolate turtles, cashews and potato chips. Knauss was an elegant lady, very refined. Doctors said she was in good health with no signs of illness. Had she lived three days longer she would have lived in three different centuries. However Guinness World Record still maintains that his record is valid. Izumi is unique on a list of supercentenarians because he is male. There is a pattern of longevity that seems to favor women. This may be due to a lot of reasons. One theory is that males live harsher, more stressful lives. Well they did in the first part of this century and before. Izumi was a Japanese born supercentenarian. He also holds the world record for the longest working life. He worked a total of 98 years. His wife died at age 90, which is still a pretty good run. He drank brown sugar shochu, an alcoholic beverage distilled from barley or rice. Interestingly he took up smoking at age 10. Hanging with the cool kids maybe? He started working in , when he was six years old this is what he says anyway and continued working until at age 98. He says his long life is the work of the gods, Buddha and the sun. There is some research to suggest that Izumi was not the oldest person at the time and put his age at a juvenile years. However this is still up for debate. If this is true Christian Mortensen is the oldest man to have ever lived at years, days. Super longevity is a fascinating topic for me. Considering that the maximum human lifespan possible is considered to be 120 years of age, makes Jeanne very special indeed. She definitely overstayed her time here on Earth. Jeanne Louise Calment was a French supercentenarian from Arles. She outlived her daughter and her grandson. She was the last person living to have personally met the artist. Her lifespan has been thoroughly documented, with more proof of her age than for any other case. Calment had no living heirs in at age 95. She made a deal to sell her apartment to lawyer Andrea-Francois Raffray on a contingency contract. This is often referred to as a reverse mortgage. He agreed to pay her francs every month until her death. Sounds like a smart move on his part considering she was 90 years old. How silly would you feel making that deal then having her live over 32 years after age 90? She described him as dirty, badly dressed and disagreeable. She remembers this visit clearly along with watching the Eiffel tower being built. At age 85 Jeanne took up fencing and at age 90 she was still riding a bicycle. She claimed to never have been athletic or fanatical about health and fitness. Calment lived alone until just before her 116th birthday. It was decided that she would be better off in a nursing home after a cooking accident nearly killed her. Jeanne was in great health and was able to walk right up until age 116 and 11 months when she fractured her femur from a fall. She became ill with the flu just before her 117th birthday.

The band played professional gigs, such as corporate and wedding functions, and Daltrey kept a close eye on the finances as well as the music. The band played instrumentals by the Shadows and the Ventures, and a variety of pop and trad jazz covers. Immediately on returning to Britain, Daltrey was sacked, [53] but was reinstated on the condition that the group became a democracy without his dominant leadership. Townshend had written it as a slow blues, but after several abortive attempts, it was turned into a more powerful song with a bass solo from Entwistle. The song used gimmicks such as a vocal stutter to simulate the speech of a mod on amphetamines, and two key changes. Among original material by Townshend, including the title track and "The Kids Are Alright", the album has several James Brown covers from the session earlier that year that Daltrey favoured. It was the first single to feature him playing an acoustic twelve-string guitar. During "My Generation", Townshend attacked Moon with his guitar; Moon suffered a black eye and bruises, and he and Entwistle left the band, but changed their minds and rejoined a week later. Entwistle contributed "Boris the Spider" and "Whiskey Man" and found a niche role as second songwriter. The suite of song fragments is about a girl who has an affair while her lover is away, but is ultimately forgiven. The group, especially Moon, were not fond of the hippie movement, and thought their violent stage act would stand in sharp contrast to the peaceful atmosphere of the festival. Hendrix was also on the bill, and was also going to smash his guitar on stage. Townshend verbally abused Hendrix and accused him of stealing his act, [75] and the pair argued about who should go on stage first, with the Who winning the argument. According to biographer Tony Fletcher, Hendrix sounded "so much better than the Who it was embarrassing". They bonded with Moon, [78] who was excited to learn that cherry bombs were legal to purchase in Alabama. Moon acquired a reputation of destroying hotel rooms while on tour, [74] with a particular interest in blowing up toilets. Entwistle said the first cherry bomb they tried "blew a hole in the suitcase and the chair". I never realised dynamite was so powerful. The resulting detonation threw Moon off his drum riser and his arm was cut by flying cymbal shrapnel. It included humorous jingles and mock commercials between songs, [86] a mini rock opera called "Rael", and "I Can See For Miles". We live pop art. Technical problems from the Hull gig resulted in the Leeds gig being used, which became Live at Leeds. Townshend wrote the song to commemorate the common man, as a contrast to the themes on Tommy. Lifehouse, which was to be a multi-media project symbolising the relationship between an artist and his audience. Townshend approached the gigs with optimism; the rest of the band were just happy to be gigging again. Things deteriorated until Townshend had a nervous breakdown and abandoned Lifehouse. Moon had moved to Los Angeles, so they used session drummers, including Kenney Jones. Elton John used his own band for "Pinball Wizard".
