If a man sees himself in a dream dead – Good. If means a long life. It means driving away his wife. It means the gods hear his cries. It means the issuing of a favourable edict. It means change awaits. Dream interpretations were often based on whether a person was a follower of Horus, one of the oldest and most significant deities in ancient Egyptian religion or Seth, the god of the desert, storms, disorder, violence and foreigners in ancient Egyptian religion. It was also believed that dreams served as a window to the other side. Living people could see the activities of the deceased through dreams.

Around , it was being advertised as being useful in the treatment of sore throat, bellyache, burns, cramps, and as a mouthwash. It was at that time the Oil was being manufactured in 3 sizes. This medicine was introduced by the Kickapoo Company around The pills were bright red, and cost. A free sample of the pills could be had by sending stamps. The Pills were still being produced after The product was discontinued sometime around The advertisements are not specific as to the nature of the medicine, but it was offered for sale at a dollar per package. After , the name Prairie Plant changed to "Kickapoo Suppositories". Early Sagwa Circa There are many different molds and some have strikingly different Indian heads embossed. Believed to have been used around This bottle replaced the "Sagwa" with the embossed head. This is believed to be the latest variant manufactured around The Indian Sagwa was trademarked in , at the same time as the Indian Oil. The original label read: The word Kickapoo was added around Originally, the label read: At that time they claimed that the Salve was a cure-all for piles, cancers, fever sores, and ulcers, was made of "Pure Buffalo Tallow", combined with herbs, roots, and barks. The Salve came in a round tin with a picture of a buffalo on the front. By a new package had been adopted which read: Advertising for this brand appears only in the literature between The brand was never trademarked. Name was later changed to "Kickapoo Worm Killer". The Worm Killer was sold for. Originally billed as being made by the Kickapoo Indians from their own natural roots and herbs. Since the advertising for the Kickapoo Indian Medicine Co. Specimens with labels have shown it to have the Clintonville, Connecticut address.
