Discovery[ edit ] Although some uncolonized provinces may be visible at the beginning of the game, much of both land and water is covered by terra incognita. Discovering these areas is essential to finding provinces to colonize. How a nation goes about exploring depends on whether El Dorado is enabled or not. That said, the following factors are true regardless of DLC: A conquistador is required to explore on land unless the country is at war; see below , and an explorer is required to explore at sea. A handful of countries notably Portugal have an explorer in despite not having the idea; these leaders cannot explore in ocean provinces until Quest for the New World is unlocked. Any neighbouring country, in the same culture or religious group as the original country, explored a province at least 75 years ago. As well, exploration can now be accomplished via the diplomatic action to Share Maps, which will reveal entire regions to the requesting nation at the cost of prestige if the nation being asked to Share Maps has already explored that region, and the nation requesting the maps has units in an adjacent region. Additionally, the diplomatic action Steal Maps can be used to reveal regions in the same manner, but without the prestige cost. Exploration without El Dorado[ edit ] An army of any size led by a conquistador can be moved into land provinces covered by terra incognita, thus discovering them. If that land is owned by another country, the conquistador will merely discover the province when movement finishes instead of actually moving into it, unless that country grants military access. A fleet of any size led by an explorer can be moved into sea zones covered by terra incognita, thus discovering them. Having a ship patrol back and forth will eventually reveal all coastal provinces typically in 6â€™12 months. Exploration with Land exploration largely follows the same process as it does without El Dorado, as listed above. The army will then automatically move through terra incognita in the region, uncovering it as it moves, with a chance to trigger various special events. Along with its centuries-long dedication to commerce and finance, the city has a proud progressive tradition. In the s, the Provo movement embodied a homegrown anarchism that championed electric cars, free bike sharing, and public nudity. And in the s, Amsterdam spawned a squatter movement that was arguably the most militant and effective of its kind in Europe. But can a city with so much turnover—and so flush with corporate cash—become a laboratory for a new urban politics? And can a local government, hemmed in and hamstrung by a conservative national leadership, set its own radical course? As far as the new administration is concerned, there is no other choice. Nor is he fazed by the right-wing chokehold on power at the national and European level. At the last city elections, in March, the Green Left logged the highest percentage of the vote a bit over 20 percent, good for 10 seats , its largest chunk of the electoral pie yet. The fact that it took four parties to build a majority is telling. Over the past 20 years, the usually stable Dutch political landscape has become slippery and fragmented. The Amsterdam council now includes a record 12 parties—including the Party for the Animals, the Party for the Elderly, the fiercely anti-Islam Forum for Democracy FvD , and Denk literally, Think , a party founded by and for citizens of Turkish and Moroccan descent, of whom there are almost , in the city. Denk and FvD, both less than four years old, are at opposite ends of the immigration debate. Both made a strong first showing with three seats each. And even the Green Left shows fault lines. In March, he raised some eyebrows when he celebrated his electoral victory with a clenched fist. Our priorities are justice and fairness. We face a huge challenge. In its fight to save Amsterdam, the new city leadership will have to defy its own national government, which since has been led by right-wing prime ministers. In recent years, austerity measures imposed by The Hague have cut the funds available for health care, education, social services, and policing, while corporate-friendly fiscal policies have turned the Netherlands into something of a tax haven. This makes political sense, Groot Wassink told me: Running 80 pages and written in decidedly unbureaucratic language, it reads like a love letter and alarm cry at once, spelling out an ambitious vision for the city and a set of equally ambitious steps to get there. The two hardest policy nuts to crack will be housing and democratization—not only because both are politically fraught but also because they present practical challenges that have tripped up the left in the past. But over the past 20 years, as national and local governments embraced market deregulation, thousands of social-rent apartments have been vacated, remodeled, and sold off at a steep markup, fueling a rapid gentrification. Like most neighborhoods in Amsterdam, De Pijp has seen a steady exodus of low-income and middle-income families. Brexit has prompted an additional expat spike ; Amsterdam is an attractive alternative to London. Earlier this year, a yoga studio near the market had to make room for a glitzy real-estate firm serving expats. While the Netherlands barely knows the kind of government-owned public housing that is common in the United States, the Dutch housing market has long been among the most regulated in Europe, thanks to national laws and these independent associations. Some of its most distinctive neighborhoods were built as affordable housing for the working and lower-middle classes. The market is locked up. During alone, the average selling price for an apartment in Amsterdam increased by . Apartments that go on the market will sell within a day, often well over the asking price, with buyers coming from all over the world. In , foreign investors sunk more than a billion dollars into the Dutch rental market; for , this number is expected to grow to 2. That same year, some 10, people, including many families with young children, left Amsterdam for the surrounding regions. Attempts to curb the rise of newcomers has tempted the left into a kind of urban nativism. These are measures that a large part of the city council supports. To aggressively expand the housing supply, the city has further promised to partner with associations and private developers to build 7, new apartments a year, with one-third reserved for low-income renters, another 22 percent for middle-tier renters, and an added quota for middle-tier homeowners. Many doubt whether this will be enough to calm the market. At the same time, they also worry that, given the complicated licensing process and the challenges of relying on private developers to build

massive quantities of housing, the city will not be able to deliver. But Amsterdam could be bolder in other areas as well, even if it means breaking some of the rules set in Brussels or the Hague. A recent attempt to replace the boroughs with neighborhood commissions was canned after less than four years. The new government is confident it can strike a better balance between an election-backed central authority and direct, local citizen participation. Related Article A Leak or a Hack? The most recent VIPS memo , released on July 24, whatever its technical merits, contributes to a much-needed critical discussion. Despite all the media coverage taking the veracity of the ICA assessment for granted, even now we have only the uncorroborated assertion of intelligence officials to go on. Those questions remain vital. Subsequently, Nation editors themselves raised questions about the editorial process that preceded the publication of the article. The article was indeed fact-checked to ensure that Patrick Lawrence, a regular Nation contributor, accurately reported the VIPS analysis and conclusions, which he did. And given the technical complexity of the material, we would have benefited from bringing on an independent expert to conduct a rigorous review of the VIPS technical claims. Freitas lays out several scenarios in which the DNC could have been hacked from the outside, although he does not rule out a leak. This is not the first time a VIPS report has been internally disputed, but it is the first time one has been released over the substantive objections of several VIPS members. With that in mind, we asked Drake and those VIPS members who agree with him to present their dissenting view. We also asked VIPS members who stand by their report to respond. In presenting this follow-up, The Nation hopes to encourage further inquiry into the crucial questions of how, why, and by whom the DNC e-mails were made publicâ€”a matter that continues to roil our politics. We especially hope that other people with special expertise or knowledge will come forward. A great edifice has been erected during this time. President Trump, members of his family, and numerous people around him stand accused of various corruptions and extensive collusion with Russians. Half a dozen simultaneous investigations proceed into these matters. Last week news broke that Special Counsel Robert Mueller had convened a grand jury, which issued its first subpoenas on August 3. Allegations of treason are common; prominent political figures and many media cultivate a case for impeachment. In retaliation, Moscow has announced that the United States must cut its embassy staff by roughly two-thirds. To suggest that military conflict between two nuclear powers inches ever closer can no longer be dismissed as hyperbole. These are the foundation stones of the edifice just outlined. The evolution of public discourse in the year since is worthy of scholarly study: Possibilities became allegations, and these became probabilities. Then the probabilities turned into certainties, and these evolved into what are now taken to be established truths. By my reckoning, it required a few days to a few weeks to advance from each of these stages to the next. This was accomplished via the indefensibly corrupt manipulations of language repeated incessantly in our leading media. Lost in a year that often appeared to veer into our peculiarly American kind of hysteria is the absence of any credible evidence of what happened last year and who was responsible for it. It is tiresome to note, but none has been made available. Instead, we are urged to accept the word of institutions and senior officials with long records of deception. Few have noticed since these evasive terms first appeared that an assessment is an opinion, nothing more, and to express high confidence is an upside-down way of admitting the absence of certain

knowledge. This is how officials avoid putting their names on the assertions we are so strongly urged to accept—as the record shows many of them have done. We come now to a moment of great gravity. Until recently, researchers undertaking this work faced critical shortcomings, and these are to be explained. But they have achieved significant new momentum in the past several weeks, and what they have done now yields very consequential fruit. Forensic investigators, intelligence analysts, system designers, program architects, and computer scientists of long experience and strongly credentialed are now producing evidence disproving the official version of key events last year. Their work is intricate and continues at a kinetic pace as we speak. But its certain results so far are two, simply stated, and freighted with implications: Hard science now demonstrates it was a leak—a download executed locally with a memory key or a similarly portable data-storage device. Forensic investigations of documents made public two weeks prior to the July 5 leak by the person or entity known as Guccifer 2. Before Guccifer posted them they were adulterated by cutting and pasting them into a blank template that had Russian as its default language. Guccifer took responsibility on June 15 for an intrusion the DNC reported on June 14 and professed to be a WikiLeaks source—claims essential to the official narrative implicating Russia in what was soon cast as an extensive hacking operation. To put the point simply, forensic science now devastates this narrative. This article is based on an examination of the documents these forensic experts and intelligence analysts have produced, notably the key papers written over the past several weeks, as well as detailed interviews with many of those conducting investigations and now drawing conclusions from them. Before proceeding into this material, several points bear noting. One, there are many other allegations implicating Russians in the political process. The work I will now report upon does not purport to prove or disprove any of them. Who delivered documents to WikiLeaks? We do not know the answers to such questions. It is entirely possible, indeed, that the answers we deserve and must demand could turn out to be multiple: One thing happened in one case, another thing in another. The new work done on the mid-June and July 5 events bears upon all else in only one respect. We are now on notice: Given that we now stand face to face with very considerable cases of duplicity, it is imperative that all official accounts of these many events be subject to rigorously skeptical questioning. What evidence of this has been produced? Such rock-bottom questions as these must now be posed in all other cases. Neither is there anything far-fetched in a reversal of the truth of this magnitude. American history is replete with similar cases. The Spanish sank the Maine in Havana harbor in February. The Sandinistas were Communists. The truth of the Maine, a war and a revolution in between, took a century to find the light of day, whereupon the official story disintegrated. We can do better now. It is an odd sensation to live through one of these episodes, especially one as big as Russiagate. But its place atop a long line of precedents can no longer be disputed. Three, regardless of what one may think about the investigations and conclusions I will now outline—and, as noted, these investigations continue—there is a bottom line attaching to them. We can even call it a red line. Under no circumstance can it be acceptable that the relevant authorities—the National Security Agency, the Justice Department via the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the Central Intelligence Agency—leave these new findings without reply. Not credibly, in any case. Silence now, should it ensue, cannot be written down as an admission of duplicity, but it will come very close to one. It requires no elaboration to apply the above point to the corporate media, which have been flaccidly satisfied with official explanations of the DNC matter from the start. Qualified experts working independently of one another began to examine the DNC case immediately after the July events. Prominent among these is a group comprising former intelligence officers, almost all of whom previously occupied senior positions. Veteran Intelligence Professionals for Sanity (VIPs), founded in 2002, now has 30 members, including a few associates with backgrounds in national-security fields other than intelligence. The chief researchers active on the DNC case are four: Most of these men have decades of experience in matters concerning Russian intelligence and the related technologies. This article reflects numerous interviews with all of them conducted in person, via Skype, or by telephone. The customary VIPs format is an open letter, typically addressed to the president. The group has written three such letters on the DNC incident, all of which were first published by Robert Parry at [www.washingtonpost.com](http://www.washingtonpost.com). Here is the latest, dated July 24; it blueprints the forensic work this article explores in detail. They have all argued that the hack theory is wrong and that a locally executed leak is the far more likely explanation. The group lacked access to positive

data. It had no lump of cyber-material to place on its lab table and analyze, because no official agency had provided any. Based on the knowledge of former officials such as Binney, the group knew that 1 if there was a hack and 2 if Russia was responsible for it, the NSA would have to have evidence of both. Binney and others surmised that the agency and associated institutions were hiding the absence of evidence behind the claim that they had to maintain secrecy to protect NSA programs.
