This is the second volume of Julian Budden's monumental three-volume survey of the operas of Verdi. Hailed on publication for its extraordinary comprehensibility, the set has become the classic reference work on its subject.

Montfort, leader of the French troops, raped a Sicilian woman who later gave birth to a son, Henri. Montfort became governor of Sicily, while the Sicilian woman brought up her son to hate him, without revealing to Henri that Montfort was his father. As they offer a toast to their homeland, they are observed by the local Sicilians, unhappy with the occupation. Somewhat drunk, Robert, a French soldier of low rank, demands that she sing and she agrees. When the governor enters, the crowd calms down. Act 2[edit] Beside the sea Procida lands on the shore from a small fishing boat. The three make plans for an uprising during the impending festivities leading to the marriages of a group of young people. Henri refuses and is arrested and dragged off. Led by Robert, a group of French soldiers arrive and Procida returns and sees that it is too late to save Henri, since the young people have come into the square and have begun to dance. As the dance becomes more lively, Robert signals to his men, who seize many of the young women, dragging them off in spite of the protests of the young Sicilian men. The dejected young men witness a passing boat filled with French nobles and Sicilian women, all bound for the ball. Procida and others determine to gain entrance to the ball and seek their revenge. Act 3[edit] Scene 1: The two men confront one another and Henri is somewhat puzzled by the way he is being treated. Taken aback but still defiant, Henri insults his father who reacts in anger as the younger man rushes out: The joy has vanished Henri is surprised when the two reveal themselves and they declare that their purpose is to save the young man. However, he is disturbed to hear that they intend to kill Montfort and when the father approaches the son, there is a hint of warning given. The Sicilians are horrified to see that Henri is being spared as the ensemble contemplates the situation. Finally, he admits that Montfort is his father and she begins to be willing to sympathise Henri! Henri begs for mercy for his friends and Montfort confronts him with one thing: Henri says nothing as the executioner appears and the couple are led away, followed by Henri. Montfort steps in to prevent him from joining them. There is general rejoicing. He leaves to find his father, but Procida arrives, announcing a plan to outwit his enemies with their massacre to take place at the foot of the altar after the vows have been said. Finally, she can go no further and she tells Henri that they cannot be married. Both men are furious with her for her seeming betrayal. This is the signal for the Sicilians to rush in and hurl themselves upon Montfort and the French. Music[edit] In summing the effect of the libretto as "a competent framework for an opera of effects, of spectacle and theatrical surprise, and Verdi ended by accepting it as such", musicologist Julian Budden then notes two of its aspects which appear distinctive and which are visible in the music. Firstly, "he used it as a basis for a new, more ample, more rhythmically complex style of melody. Here the model of Meyerbeer was important Secondly, he seized the opportunity of solving a problem which had eluded him in a somewhat similar work, *La battaglia di Legnano* ; namely that of reconciling the private and public emotions of the main characters. Parker states "with very few exceptions, its main lyrical numbers lack the melodic immediacy of the trio of Italian operas *Rigoletto*, *Il trovatore* and *La traviata* that immediately preceded it. Petersburg and arrived in Paris on 24 February Two encounters influenced his decision to commence work on a composition for the exhibition. The first was with the composer Daniel Auber who apparently conveyed to Verdi that he was composing a march for the occasion. But in a subsequent letter to Costa he indicated he was writing an overture. Costa relayed this information to the commissioners who agreed with the form of composition. Marvin suggests the purpose of the meeting might have been to indirectly prompt Verdi to work on the commission. As a result of this meeting, Boito was charged with writing the text of the proposed work. Verdi arrived in London on 20 April, expecting that his work would be performed. Through much wrangling the commissioners remained firm in their refusal, Costa declaring that because it was scored for voices, not just for orchestra, it was against the rules of the Commission, that it had not arrived in time, and that there would not be enough time to rehearse. According to the Musical World, "The whole feeling of the country in this instance is with the Italian Maestro, and against the Commissioners. The cry has gone forth from one end of the kingdom to the other that a grievous wrong has been done, and that restitution is imperatively demanded. The concert received only a lukewarm reception, making Verdi happy that his Cantata had not been programmed. Performance good on the whole, very good on the part of the orchestra. Arditi is a good conductor. A review in the Revue et gazette musicale 1 June underscores the difficulty: The report in The Daily Telegraph provides an example of the exaggerated reaction: At the conclusion of the Cantata Signor Verdi was loudly called for, and, after some delay, was led on by the energetic and enthusiastic Mdlle. Tietjens , not once nor twice only, but several times, to receive the heartiest tribute of approbation which an appreciative and sympathetic English audience could bestow. Not that the manifestations of good feelings were confined to applause alone, for bouquets and wreaths were showered on the favourite maestro, and favourite vocalists were even roused from their ordinary listlessness to do demonstrative honour to their illustrious countryman. The applause still continuing, the whole Cantata was then repeated. At the conclusion of the second performance Signor Verdi was then led forward by Signor Giuglini , and even after the curtain fell, he was compelled again to bow his acknowledgments. The solo was performed by a soprano, Rosina Penco. The film, which featured a performance by Toscanini and the same forces as the broadcast, was narrated by Burgess Meredith.
