Participation is free for accepted applicants. Support provided includes free space; access to alumni, corporate partners, and investors; and participation in various demo day events. And since , their PKU Incubation Camp has incubated six batches of around 30 teams each, including notable graduate bike-sharing giant Ofo. Each batch receives six months of office space; curated mentoring from a pool of over experts; and other third-party services. While PKU affiliation is advantageous, the program is not restricted to alumni. Program fees vary by topic area. They have incubated over ventures since first opening in in Beijing, including such startups as Musical. Members receive workspace, business model consulting, investment guidance, and other support in growing their business. TechTemple is a frequent host of many Beijing startup events, bringing resources from across the ecosystem to benefit its members. Fees start at 2, RMB per month, depending on location and space required. They expanded to provide desks, business services, community events, and even investment.

This book was no exception. It is a great place to begin exploring the topic. History[ edit ] Building work on the Yonghe Temple started in during the Qing dynasty on the site where originally stood an official residence for court eunuchs of the previous dynasty. It was then converted into the residence of Yinzhen Prince Yong , the fourth son of the Kangxi Emperor. After Prince Yong ascended the throne as the Yongzheng Emperor in , half of the building was converted into a lamasery, a monastery for monks of Tibetan Buddhism. The other half remained an imperial palace. The Qianlong Emperor , who succeeded the Yongzheng Emperor, gave the temple imperial status signified by having its turquoise tiles replaced with yellow tiles which were reserved for the emperor. Subsequently, the monastery became a residence for large numbers of Tibetan Buddhist monks from Mongolia and Tibet , and so the Yonghe Lamasery became the national centre of Lama administration. After the Chinese Civil War ended in , the temple was declared a national monument and closed for the following 32 years. Reopened to the public in , it is today both a functioning temple and highly popular tourist attraction in the city. The main gate is at the southern end of this axis. Along the axis, there are five main halls which are separated by courtyards: The Gate Hall of Harmony and Peace is the southernmost of the main halls, it served originally as the main entrance to the monastery. In the center of the hall stands a statue of the Maitreya Buddha , along the walls statues of the four Heavenly Kings are arranged. The Hall of Harmony and Peace is the main building of the temple. Along the sides of the hall, the statues of the 18 Arhats are placed. A mural in the hall shows the bodhisattva Avalokitesvara. Today, a statue of the Bhaiṣajya-guru healing Buddha stands in this hall. The Hall of the Wheel of the Law functions as a place for reading scriptures and conducting religious ceremonies. It contains a large statue of Je Tsongkhapa , founder of the Geluk School. The hall also contains the Five-Hundred- Arhat -Hill, a carving made of red sandalwood with statues of the arhats made from five different metals gold, silver, copper, iron, and tin. The Pavilion of Ten Thousand Happinesses sometimes referred to as "The Hall of Boundless Happiness" contains an 18m tall with an additional 8m underground, making it 26m in total statue of the Maitreya Buddha carved from a single piece of White Sandalwood.
