There are accounts of the Spanish taking the settlers and their slaves captive, marching them to Merida and confiscating their property. There were 51 votes in favour of evacuation and 65 votes against. The majority of 14 against general evacuation included the names of a group of persons who arrived late from the village of Flowers Bank on the Belize River, after the meeting was called to order, but who nevertheless were in time for the vote on the question of whether the settlers should stay and fight or should abandon the settlement. Moss, the commanding officer aboard H. Merlin and from D. On the following day some six of the largest of the Spanish fleet attempted to advance over Montego Caye Shoal with the intent to get possession of St. The Spaniards, on sighting the British warship with reinforcement by a flotilla consisting of the Towser, Tickler, Mermaid, Swinger, Teazer, and eight flat gun boats, returned to an anchorage between Long Caye and Caye Chapel. The British commanders believed that the enemy would change their mode of attack and launch an amphibious assault on their post near Haul Over. On the morning of the 10th of September, 14 of the largest vessels of the Spanish fleet, all with heavy guns and towing smaller vessels laden with soldiers, weighed anchor and came to within a mile and a half of the British fleet. At noon, nine of the Spanish vessels began to advance as the Merlin supported by an assortment of sloops and gun boats was drawn up abreast of the channel. Captain Moss gave the order to engage the enemy. The action lasted two and a half hours until the enemy fell into confusion, cut loose their cables and using both sail and oars hastily retreated. Captain Moss gave signal for our vessels to give chase until nightfall made pursuit too dangerous as the narrow channels were difficult to navigate. The accounts relate that the Spaniards remained under Caye Chapel until the 15th of September on which day some of their vessels made anchor at Caye Caulker. At daylight on the 16th it was discovered that they stole off under the cover of darkness, cleared the shallows and shaped their course northward for Bacalar. The British commanding officer in his dispatch gives credit to the manner in which the Colonial militia comprised of the settlers, some experienced bush men and negroes performed in the defensive operations. Captain Moss wrote of the wonderful spirit of the negro slaves who manned their small craft canoes, dories and pit pans. Whether they were white, black, called Baymen, slaves, free coloured or Maya they were the settlers, our forbears who were brave enough to stay and defend this territory against the Spanish challenge to British settlement in the Bay of Honduras. We sing in the patriotic song: All died on this land which my glad heart acquire, that gave us the freedom our great hearts inspire. Ernest Cain in his manuscript writes that Lamb started the celebrations with the full support of patriotic followers. From the historical analysis available to us there is the sense that there was no division among the people at that time. People realized that they were celebrating the greatest event in the history of the country. It is believed that the aim of the members of the Centennial committee was to foster a spirit of unity and harmony between all groups, descendants of both the masters and slaves whose determined sacrifice made possible the nation we enjoy. From then forward the festivities seemed to generally follow this tradition. The development of party politics in our small Caribbean societies can be so divisive, devious and pernicious. Prior to the evolution of party politics, the events organized by the Loyal and Patriotic Order of the Baymen included the participation of the Governor, the representative of Her Majesty in the colony. On such occasions, the Governor would be present to receive the pledges of loyalty from the citizens and be invited to deliver remarks at such events celebrating the battle. Party politics, however, divided the celebration of the Battle of St. The nationalist leaders felt in their resistance to British colonization it was necessary to diminish the significance of the Battle of St. Imagine, the ruling party went as far as to strongly discourage or censor air play of the traditional patriotic songs and poems on the then only radio station, the government controlled propaganda machinery Radio Belize. The thinking at the time was that because of the threat of external aggression from Guatemala, Belize should move into Independence under the security umbrella of our international diplomatic efforts and therefore the date of Independence had to be set when the UN General Assembly was meeting in regular

session. The official Independence proclamation was therefore set for 21st September and on the 23rd September we were formally admitted as a state member of the United Nations at a ceremony held at UN Headquarters in New York. I have absolutely no doubt in my mind that the agenda of the PUP was to destroy the history of the Battle of St. If the date for Independence was set for the 10th of September that would have destroyed the celebrations marking the Battle of St. The paragraph above explains why it could not have been done. It would have been so divisive if the date for Independence coincided with the anniversary of the Battle of St. It would have confused the nation. The Loyal and Patriotic Order of the Baymen had to hold its pageants and other activities in an enclosed venue so it could levy an admission charge to help defray the costs. Dorothy Lewis was crowned Queen on that occasion. Thereafter the PUP refused to allow the Rogers Stadium or any other enclosed public venue controlled by Government to be used for the Queen of the Bay. Businessman Santiago Castillo generously agreed to the use of his cinemas for the pageant. Crowds would go to the Memorial Park to witness the events leading up to the so called National Day on the Tenth of September. There would be two parades. Can you imagine how childlike partisan politics can be? The Police Department would have them move off and they were so efficient on that day in controlling public order that there was never any clash of both parades on the 10th September. This went on for years and years. The PUP were then in their heyday. During the decade of the 60s and for the better part of the 70s the PUP continued on their agenda to destroy the memory of the Battle of St. The general elections held in was the first occasion at which the PUP faced a threat from a credible alternative to the ruling party. The UDP came within 17 votes for a dead heat in that election. Recall that Ken Tillett lost in the Collet division by one vote; his brother was 12 votes short of victory in Corozal and Paul Rodriguez came 4 votes shy of success in the Pickstock division. This was the first time that the PUP could lose an election. What was happening in that period was that the stalwarts from families such as: Eventually Henry Young took up a major portion of the responsibility of organizing and promoting these events. Philip Goldson, who single-handedly fought off the affronts from the people seeking to destroy our heritage. He was ridiculed and caricatured on many occasions. Some years the parade was big and at others participation was inconsequential. In that era no public officer would dare be seen marching in this parade. Let me digress a little. I had to go past a barber shop located where the Belize Times Press currently stands. The barber was no other than Antonio Soberanis, who today we hail as a patriot. He had an effigy of the Hon. I now return to the subject matter. It was the Committee of 40, headed by Henry Young and Edward Dougal Flowers now deceased, who revived the celebrations surrounding the Tenth of September giving it broad appeal and reinstating carnival in Belize. I am told that that in the late 50s there was carnival in Belize. The PUP in their effort to sabotage the Tenth celebrations engaged all the bands. Philip Goldson to go out in the streets marching with instruments improvised from pots and pans, graters and forks so they could be some semblance of music. The Committee of 40 in the mid 70s engaged the services of Calypso Rose, and her talent harnessed with that of Lord Rhaburn electrified the road march on the Tenth and the Carnival parade which was staged on the Saturday preceding the 10th of September. All that time the Hon. Philip Goldson remained involved, we are eternally grateful to the Hon. The younger generation takes for granted what has been retained only through the large personal sacrifices of many like the Hon. The partisan division in the celebration of the 10th of September continued until Belize achieved its Independence from Great Britain on 21st September. Thereafter, I noted that the celebrations committee became more representative and the organizers agreed on a unified approach to the now almost month-long calendar of festivities which lead up to the commemoration of the anniversary of the Battle of St. Imagine there was no popular consultation on the proposed national flag. In a hastily arranged competition only weeks before the event a proposal to add the red margins was offered as a balm, representative of the two-party system of our government and in proportions indicating the current balance of power in the House of Representatives at the time. He has also questioned why in our motto we in fact admit a reluctance to toil in the sunshine. In similar manner there was no consensus sought on the national anthem. Today a prayer for our nation is still a matter of controversy. The decision on the choice on something on the scale of a national prayer should have never been left to only a few individuals in Mr. A check of the records of the National Assembly show that to date there has been no resolution passed to designate a national prayer. To many of us the prominence given to the

events commemorating the 10th September Battle of St. It in fact defined the road to nationhood. It was from this seminal event which displayed the indomitable spirit of our forefathers to defend the settlement and should be highlighted in its proper perspective as the birth of our nation. Developments since though to the formal establishment of the colony in and on to the devaluation of the British Honduras dollar in have been described by one notable Belizean scholar as simply expanding and consolidating British authority. The attainment of political Independence on the 21st September ushered in a new era and signaled our necessary political maturity to ably and confidently define our future. Our forefathers way back then fought to preserve this heritage for us. Simon Lamb created the celebrations of the Battle of St. Philip Goldson and the Loyal and Patriotic Order of the Baymen fought those that had their own political agenda to preserve and enhance the rich history of the Battle that was fought at St. Authentic documents, some with eyewitness accounts, in UK, Spanish and Belizean archives and archaeological evidence from the area show ample proof of the 18th century Spanish attacks on the British settlement in the Bay of Honduras which culminated in the Battle at St. It was no myth. This part of our history must be told so people can understand that we have reached here not by smooth sailing but we have had our bumps and turns in the murky political waters of Belize. Drought Monitor drought map valid October 2, Like the last several months, the upper-level circulation pattern was quite active during September with ridge and trough patterns migrating through the jet stream flow over the CONUS. Frequent ridging or a northwesterly flow kept much of the West drier and warmer than normal. The Southwest was especially warm, with the excessive heat increasing evapotranspiration water demand. The high pressure pattern kept fronts and low pressure systems out of the eastern CONUS at first, resulting in drier-than-normal conditions. But the fronts eventually penetrated the South and East, and their precipitation was supplemented by tropical systems which came in from the Gulf of Mexico Tropical Storm Gordon and Atlantic Hurricane Florence. Another tropical system Olivia soaked Hawaii. As a result, drought and abnormal dryness expanded, intensified, or developed in parts of the West, northern Plains, Southeast, and Northeast, as well as southeast Alaska, but contracted across much of Texas, parts of the central and northern Plains to Midwest, and other parts of the West, Southeast, and Northeast, as well as Hawaii and Puerto Rico. The dry conditions during September were a continuation of persistent dryness that has lasted 24 months, especially for the Southwest Standardized Precipitation Index maps for the last 1, 2, 3, 6, 9, 12, 24 months. According to the Palmer Drought Index, which goes back to the beginning of the 20th century, about Drought conditions at the end of the month, as depicted on the October 2nd, USDM map, included the following core drought and abnormally dry areas: A large area of abnormal dryness D0 to severe D2 drought stretched across the West, with centers of extreme D3 drought in the Pacific Northwest and extreme to exceptional D4 drought in the Southwest. The percent area of the West from the Rockies to the West Coast in moderate to extreme drought based on the Palmer Drought Index grew slowly in the fall then rapidly increased in December and continued to increase in January and February, growing from Above-normal precipitation improved conditions in California and Nevada in March, so the Palmer percent area in drought shrank to April was wet in northern California and northwest Nevada, and Washington to the northern Rockies, and May was wet in Nevada to southern California, but extremely dry conditions occurred along the coast in May, especially in Oregon and Washington; California to Colorado were dry in June; the Pacific Northwest to northern and central Rockies were dry in July; several parts of the West were dry in August; and most of the West was very dry in September. The dry conditions were coupled with unusual warmth in parts to much of the West during May, June, July, August, and September which increased evapotranspiration, thus exacerbating drought conditions 5-month SPEI vs. As a result, the Palmer Drought Index measure of drought area expanded to Areas of moderate D1 to extreme drought covered parts of the southern and northern Plains to Upper Mississippi Valley, and moderate to exceptional drought covered the central Plains to Mid-Mississippi Valley. Moderate to severe drought persisted in the Northeast. Pockets of moderate drought developed in the Southeast and lingered in the Great Lakes region. Abnormal dryness and moderate drought persisted, and severe drought developed, in Alaska. Severe drought ended with abnormal dryness to moderate drought lingering in Hawaii, and abnormal dryness shrank but lingered in Puerto Rico. Palmer Drought Index The Palmer drought indices measure the balance between moisture demand evapotranspiration driven by temperature and moisture supply precipitation. The PDSI map shows less severe and extensive drought as well as wet spell conditions in some parts of the country than the PHDI map because the meteorological conditions that produce drought and wet spell conditions are not as long-lasting as the hydrological impacts. Used together, the Palmer Z Index and PHDI maps show that short-term dry conditions continued in September across much of the West over areas that were in drought at the end of August, expanding and intensifying long-term drought. Short-term dry conditions occurred in the northern portions of the Northeast and parts of the Great Lakes, resulting in new areas of long-term drought. Short-term dry conditions occurred in parts of the Southeast, eliminating previous areas of long-term wet conditions. Near-normal to wet short-term conditions occurred across much of the Plains and in the Mid-Atlantic region, shrinking previous areas of

long-term drought. The SPI maps here show the spatial extent of anomalously wet and dry areas at time scales ranging from 1 month to 24 months. The SPI maps illustrate how moisture conditions have varied considerably through time and space over the last two years. Dryness dominates the West at the 1- to 3-month time scales, is present in parts of the West for the last 6 to 12 months, and afflicts the Southwest at all time scales. Parts of the Southeast are dry at the 1- to 2-month time scales. Parts of the northern Plains are dry at the 2- to 3-month time scales. Dryness is evident from the central Plains to Mid-Mississippi Valley at the 6- to 12-month time scales. Standardized Precipitation Evapotranspiration Index The SPI measures water supply precipitation, while the SPEI Standardized Precipitation Evapotranspiration Index measures the combination of water supply precipitation and water demand evapotranspiration as computed from temperature. Warmer temperatures tend to increase evapotranspiration, which generally makes droughts more intense. Temperatures during September were well above normal across much of the West, especially the Southwest, with record warmth occurring in some areas. Regional Discussion Map of percent of normal precipitation for Hawaii, September September was wetter than normal across the Hawaiian islands, except for a few stations on the Big Island, due to heavy rains from Tropical Storm Olivia. The wetness of September and August tipped the multi-month precipitation totals for almost all of the stations into the wet category for the last 2, 3, 4, 6, 9, and 12 months. Dryness at some stations became evident at the longer time periods last 24 and 36 months. Olivia and Hurricane Lane last month left well-above-normal streamflow across the island chain. Moderate to severe drought covered about a third of the state. Alaska gridded precipitation rank map, September September was drier than normal across western and southern Alaska, and wetter than normal in the northeast. Record dryness occurred across parts of the northern panhandle to south central coast. At longer time scales, dryness continued widespread across the panhandle and south central regions, and lingered in some parts of the northwest. The southern portions of the panhandle were record dry for the last 12 months, with dryness still widespread across the southern portions of the state at 24 to 36 months. Temperatures during September were warmer than normal across most of the state, but cooler than average in the northeastern portions. This pattern held for the last 2 to 6 months. Warmer-than-normal temperatures began to dominate across the state at the 9-month time scale. Record warmth was evident at some time scales. Low elevation station temperature anomaly maps for the last 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 12 months. Divisional temperature rank maps for the last 1, 3, 6, 9, 12 months. Gridded temperature percentile maps for the last 1, 3, 9 months. Streamflow was below normal in the panhandle, south central, and northwest regions. According to reports from the National Weather Service, the Metlakatla area had low water at their hydroelectric facility, and the low stream flows posed a threat to fisheries. Abnormally dry to moderate drought conditions continued in the panhandle, with the southern portions of the panhandle going to severe drought. Puerto Rico percent of normal precipitation map, September Southern and eastern portions of Puerto Rico were drier than normal during September, with wetter-than-normal conditions in the northwest and north coastal regions. This anomaly pattern persisted at the 2- and 3-month time scales. Drier-than-normal conditions dominated the south-central to southwestern areas, with wetter-than-normal conditions to the north and east, at longer time scales last 6, 9, 12 months. Soils were dry in the south central region to southwest coast, but streamflow was mostly near normal except for some low streams in the southwest. As seen on the October 2nd USDM map, abnormal dryness contracted to the south central areas, covering about 14 percent of the island. Four states in the West had a top ten dry September, including Utah second driest, Idaho fourth driest, California sixth driest, and Nevada seventh driest. Wyoming ranked twelfth driest in the record. For the last three months July-September, Idaho and Oregon clocked in at second driest, while California ranked eleventh driest. Utah had the ninth driest April-September and Colorado the tenth driest. Colorado also had the eighth driest January-September. The Southwest states stood out for the last twelve months October-September, with Utah ranking driest on record, Colorado second driest, Arizona eighth driest, and New Mexico tenth driest. March is the beginning of the growing season for the Primary Corn and Soybean agricultural belt. For March-September, temperatures were mostly near to warmer than normal and precipitation mostly wetter than

normal. This 7-month period ranked as the tenth wettest and 26th warmest March-September, regionwide, in the record. The prolonged below-normal precipitation has dried soils and inhibited rangeland, pasture land, and crop growth in many states in the West as well as Missouri and, in the Southeast, Georgia, South Carolina, and Florida. According to September 30th statistics from the U. Department of Agriculture, 23 percent of the topsoil and 28 percent of the subsoil was rated short or very short of moisture dry or very dry nationwide, 23 percent of the pasture and rangeland was rated in poor to very poor condition, and only 12 percent of the corn crop and 10 percent of the soybean crop was rated in poor to very poor condition, but 25 percent of the cotton crop was rated poor to very poor. As of October 2nd, drought was affecting five percent of corn production, seven percent of soybean production, 20 percent of hay acreage, 19 percent of cattle inventory, 16 percent of winter wheat production, and 42 percent of spring wheat production. West As summarized by the High Plains Regional Climate Center, it was a tale of extremes regarding precipitation in September, as some areas were excessively wet while others were extremely dry. Some areas in drought across the region saw the continuation of dry conditions in September. For instance, western Colorado, southern Wyoming, portions of the Dakotas, and northeastern Kansas did not receive any drought relief. Although the primary growing season is coming to an end, winter wheat planting is underway. However, winter wheat producers in these areas were concerned about continued dryness, as moisture is needed going into winter for adequate growth of the crop. In western Colorado, streamflows continued to be well below normal, as precipitation was less than 25 percent of normal in many locations. September was also dry for much of Wyoming, which caused streamflows to fall below normal throughout portions of the state. Drought conditions improved in some areas but worsened in others in September, according to the USDM. Overall, the area in drought D1-D4 in the High Plains increased by approximately three percent. For much of the region it was a dry month, causing drought to intensify. Western and northern Colorado experienced warm and dry conditions during September, which exacerbated impacts. For instance, streamflows were low, with many streams experiencing flows that were less than the 10th percentile for this time of year. The drought has impacted water supplies, as reservoir levels continued to drop. Reservoir levels at Lake Powell and Lake Mead, which provide water to multiple states in the West, were less than the 10th percentile in September. Drought also intensified in the Dakotas where it has been persistently dry. In North Dakota, producers reported stressed pastures, a shortage of hay, and disappointing soybean yields in dry areas. Producers in the Dakotas have voiced concerns about the dryness coinciding with winter wheat planting. Areas that received drought relief in September included northeastern and southwestern portions of Kansas, as well as southeastern Colorado. Heavy rains early in the month brought about a one to two-category improvement in these areas, which helped improve soil moisture conditions.

Finally for the tenth of September, St. Some teachers chose to give each child the 25 cents, but most of them chose to fill a bag of goodies and gave them to the children after the parade. By Angel Nuñez. On September 10, we celebrate the Battle of St. George's Caye. This is the time of the year when Belize dresses itself with its patriotic colors: blue, white and red.

The months of September [meaning "the seventh"] through December [meaning "the tenth"] are already numeric names, although their meanings do not match their positions in either the Julian or the Gregorian calendar since the Romans changed the first month of a year from March to January. Individual days were assigned, instead of to the traditional saints, to people noteworthy for mostly secular achievements; 25 December is assigned to both Jesus and Newton. The new Republican government sought to institute, among other reforms, a new social and legal system, a new system of weights and measures which became the metric system, and a new calendar. Amid nostalgia for the ancient Roman Republic, the theories of the Enlightenment were at their peak, and the devisers of the new systems looked to nature for their inspiration. Natural constants, multiples of ten, and Latin as well as Ancient Greek derivations formed the fundamental blocks from which the new systems were built. As the rapporteur of the commission, Charles-Gilbert Romme presented the new calendar to the Jacobin-controlled National Convention on 23 September, which adopted it on 24 October and also extended it proleptically to its epoch of 22 September. It is because of his position as rapporteur of the commission that the creation of the republican calendar is attributed to Romme. Indeed, there was initially a debate as to whether the calendar should celebrate the Great Revolution, which began in July, or the Republic, which was established in . It was in , with the practical problem of dating financial transactions, that the legislative assembly was confronted with the problem of the calendar. Originally, the choice of epoch was either 1 January or 14 July. After some hesitation the assembly decided on 2 January that all official documents would use the "era of Liberty" and that the year IV of Liberty started on 1 January. This usage was modified on 22 September when the Republic was proclaimed and the Convention decided that all public documents would be dated Year I of the French Republic. The decree of 2 January stipulated that the year II of the Republic began on 1 January; this was revoked with the introduction of the new calendar, which set 22 September as the beginning of year II. The establishment of the Republic was used as the epochal date for the calendar; therefore, the calendar commemorates the Republic, not the Revolution. French coins of the period naturally used this calendar. Many show the year French: The Concordat of re-established the Roman Catholic Church as an official institution in France, although not as the state religion of France. The concordat took effect from Easter Sunday, 28 Germinal, Year XI 8 April; it restored the names of the days of the week to the ones from the Gregorian Calendar, and fixed Sunday as the official day of rest and religious celebration. As a result, Roman Numeral I indicates the first year of the republic, that is, the year before the calendar actually came into use. By law, the beginning of each year was set at midnight, beginning on the day the apparent autumnal equinox falls at the Paris Observatory. The five or six extra days needed to approximate the solar or tropical year were placed after the months at the end of each year and called complementary days. This arrangement was an almost exact copy of the calendar used by the Ancient Egyptians, though in their case the beginning of the year was marked by summer solstice rather than autumn equinox. A period of four years ending on a leap day was to be called a "Franciade". The name "Olympique" was originally proposed [5] but changed to Franciade to commemorate the fact that it had taken the revolution four years to establish a republican government in France. Decimal time Each day in the Republican Calendar was divided into ten hours, each hour into decimal minutes, and each decimal minute into decimal seconds. Thus an hour was conventional minutes more than twice as long as a conventional hour, a minute was . Clocks were manufactured to display this decimal time, but it did not catch on. Mandatory use of decimal time was officially suspended 7 April, although some cities continued to use decimal time as late as . Months[edit] The Republican calendar year began the day the autumnal equinox occurred in Paris, and had twelve months of 30 days each, which were given new names based on nature, principally having to do with the prevailing weather in and around Paris. Most of the month names were new words coined from French, Latin, or Greek. The endings of the names are grouped by season. Like the French originals, they are neologisms suggesting a

meaning related to the season.
