Introduction 1 In the late s news of famines in India and China appeared continuously in Irish newspapers. The three cheers refer to a notorious episode in November when a s A great deal has been said about over-population in India, just as there has been talk about overpopulation in Ireland, and the Earl of Beaconsfield, or some other political leader, may yet call for three cheers for famine for having removed "the redundant people. There was a general fear that if the harvest of was also poor there would be a famine in Ireland. A further difference was the political mobilisation that had emerged in the s which united constitutionalists and revolutionaries and which used the spectre of the Great Famine to forge a mass movement seeking tenant rights and national independence. By the end of , newspapers were reporting severe distress amongst tenants all over the areas of Ireland traditionally dependent on the potato. This distress was especially disquieting as it arrived in the aftermath of previous years of relative prosperity. Vaughan noted that the prosperity and the later distress were no more significant than in the previous post-famine downturn of , a crucial difference in , in the lead up to the Land War, was the organisational capabilities of the Fenian movement which had been counting on a convergence of factors in order to take a central role in Irish political life. The distress caused in Ireland by the poor harvest of was hard felt as the year drew to a close. With six or more months to go before the first potato crop of could be harvested, poorer districts of the country were pervaded by a sense of urgency and panic, of which the newly-formed Irish National Land League were cognisant. Cork, two local magistrates refused to open an inquest into the reported death of a man from starvation for fear that a verdict of a political nature would be returned, thereby implicating the government in the death. Kilkenny, with its good agricultural land, local papers noted the distress throughout the whole county. Cork Board of Guardians into the reported death of a woman, Nora Goodwin, from starvation. John Goodwin was a labourer and a general caretaker in the employ of Isaac Notter. He had a house and a piece of land from Notter and received 6d. He cultivated potatoes on his land but had a poor harvest in and by April he was taken ill. By November, his wife was also ill. They received outdoor relief and Isaac Notter provided soup, rice and rice pudding from his own house to the family. However, Mrs Goodwin remained unwell and existed only on milk and tea that her husband purchased. Mrs Goodwin refused to go into the Poor House and died in early However, what is noteworthy about the case is, firstly, the paternalistic nature of the relationship between the employer, Notter, and his employee. Notter provided personal charity and secured financial relief from the Poor Law Board, where he was on the Board of Guardians, without the Goodwins applying for it. Secondly, the case illustrates the fact that one incident of reported starvation in could come to the attention of a great number of government offices and officers, from the local Poor Law Union board up to the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland and back down to the Local Government Board. In January he visited his native Straide, in Co. Mayo, for the first time in nearly 30 years. In his family, having survived the famine, were evicted from their cottage which was pulled down. At first his parents sought refuge in the Swinford workhouse but on realising that the family was to be split up, his mother Catherine insisted that they leave the institution immediately. They made their way to Haslingden in England where Davitt grew up. When Davitt emerged from prison, he was determined to make his mark on the moribund Fenian movement in Ireland and to help the poorest classes of tenant farmers and labourers. While the Fenian organisation in Ireland was in disarray, in the USA the organisational capacity of the movement there was demonstrated by the Catalpa rescue of Fenian prisoners from Australia, which was orchestrated by John Devoy of Clan-na-Gael. Wicklow, Charles Stewart Parnell. He had made a name for himself as an obstructionist in the House of Commons, one of a small group of Irish MPs who delayed the proceedings in the House by engaging in long speeches and various procedural methods to obstruct the passing of legislation in order to highlight Irish grievances. The New Departure was to focus on advocating for tenant rights for the farmers of Ireland and this policy was summed up by the 3 Fs fair rents, fixity of tenure and free sale , while advancing the nationalist cause. The policy

aimed at giving tenants the rights to sell their interest in their holdings and be compensated for any improvements they made to the land on either moving on or eviction. While openly courting their favour and joining with the advanced Nationalists in founding the Irish National Land League in , he maintained a delicate balancing act which allowed him to use their organisation to take control of the constitutional Home Rule Party in Comerford, *The Fenians in Context*: This comment is not a criticism of R. V Comerford but rather a comment on his work as publish Mayo, following his release from prison and found that the two years of economic downturn had lead to extreme distress amongst the poorer tenant farmers and labourers. According to Comerford, in Mayo there were strong lay political leaders most of whom were members of the IRB. The first public meeting was held at Irishtown on 20th April. The potential of a broad-based movement such as was organically emerging in Mayo was not lost on either Davitt or Devoy, who realised that a national movement based on similar lines and headed by Parnell could assist their cause. Though there were competing threads within the organisation, it was the genuine fear of famine in Ireland in the winter of that ensured its initial success in raising funds, inspiring local activists and ensuring the mass support that marked the first phase of the Land War Janis, *A Greater Ireland*: The trip centred on organising American support for the Land League and at the outset fundraising focused on the relief of distress in Ireland but, by its end, Parnell had also helped create the Land League in the USA. His speeches emphasised the looming humanitarian crisis in Ireland and indeed echoed the words of John Mitchel which were sure to appeal to the generations of famine and post-famine emigrants in the USA. The same article noted a franc donation from the bishop of Le Mans and that the Bishop of Arras had addressed the parish priests of his diocese on the advisability of assisting the Irish, despite privations in France. Janis, *A Greater Ireland*, op cit, p. Moody felt that Parnell was collecting a vast sum on his US tour with Dillon and one month into the tour Parnell could measure the material results and saw other funds as competitors. In the Skull Poor Law Union, which had a reported population of 13, in , by the end of January, the privations of the winter of appeared to have had the effect of uniting the community, farmers and landlords together in their efforts to seek help in order to alleviate the suffering of the poor in their district. The latter were Guardians by virtue of being magistrates or justices of the peace resident in the union. Indeed it may have been his public harangues that forced the landlords to apply to borrow money from the government to commence relief works. The country is in a deplorable state; Why half the guardians in the union are not able to pay their rates. When this is the state of the guardians, what must be the state of the poorer classes? In Ballydehob troops of men may be seen everyday idle and with nothing to eat, living on the expectation of the Cooshen Copper mine going to work shortly. The landlords of the country are in a great measure to blame for the destitution that prevails. They do not feel the misery themselves, and they look on callous hearted and apathetic, while their dependents are famishing with hunger. However, the Chairman, Capt. Somerville, feared that the tenants would not pay the interest on the money if the landlords borrowed it from the Board of Works. It is unsurprising that it was Richard Hodnett, who had raised the spectre of starvation and famine in early , who would lead its foundation before the end of the year. Burke, Dublin Castle, 13 Jan. Poor Law Boards could borrow sums for 35 years, pay no interest for the first two years and carry out works that would employ the needy of the district. Other necessary works, such as drainage, making footpaths, and repairing sewers and channels inside villages or towns, were also eligible. This date was deemed to be too soon by all present and it was noted that farmers would be unlikely to have their potatoes harvested by that date and so would be in distress. One Poor Law Guardian, J. Coughlan, received a loud cheer when he declared that the farmers were in as much need of relief as the labourers. Several speakers suggested that the farmers were in need of seed potatoes and should be supplied with these from Scotland and given meal to eat while their potatoes grew.

Appointed to the United States Naval Academy in , he was graduated in , being assigned the rank of ensign. He then served several tours of duty, , and His most notable peace-time achievement was his work while in command of the Coast Survey, U. During these years, associated with Alexander Agassiz, he was engaged in deep-sea explorations, principally in the Gulf of Mexico, where he made a complete deep-water survey of the gulf. While on this duty he invented a deep-sea sounding machine based on the wire-sounding apparatus of Sir William Thomson, and other devices for specimen collecting at various depths of the sea. These inventions practically revolutionized deep-sea sounding and dredging. For his contributions to the advance of scientific exploration, Emperor Wilhelm I bestowed upon him the decoration of the Red Eagle of Prussia. After completing the coast survey, he served in the Hydrographic Office at Washington from to and, from to , he was chief hydrographer in the Navy Department. Having been advanced through the preceding ranks, he was commissioned captain, March 21, , and was in command of the battleship Maine from April 10 of that year until it was destroyed by explosion in Havana harbor, February 15, The naval court of inquiry exonerated him and his officers and crew from all blame for the disaster. On May 25, , in command of the St. After a year spent at League Island Navy Yard, where he was called to improve the management and production of ship building activities, he was commissioned rear-admiral, August 11, . He was then given a command of the Caribbean Squadron U. Newark , which assisted in the U. Marine invasion of San Domingo on June 18, He sailed for France with a fleet of four ships and brought back the body of John Paul Jones in his flagship, the Brooklyn, arriving in Annapolis July 25, After commissioning the squadron of the North Atlantic fleet for two years, he retired on January 16, The remaining years of his life were not particularly happy ones, being greatly distressed because of problems relating to his divorce from Eliza Lockwood Sigsbee, to whom he had been married to in They had four children. After their separation, he resided with his nurse, Nellie G. Gunther, until his death. Scope and Content The papers of Charles D. Sigsbee , generated mostly between and , document not only his many achievements as a naval officer, but also the intricate details of his tragic personal relationship with his wife and children. The story of his personal life is revealed mostly through his correspondence with his wife, children, and close relatives. Letters he had written contain lengthy discussions of his daily work routine, especially when at sea. They provide an interesting perspective of working conditions and naval life, in general, during the second half of the nineteenth century. Family matters were also the subject of many letters, especially after his marital problems came to full fruition. In later years her anger became more pronounced with accusations about her husband having affairs with other women. For further consideration of this matter, there are additional files that contain the separation agreement, along with briefs of court proceedings and his letters to Nellie Gunther Milligan. These papers also contain orders, correspondence, memoranda, and reports generated by his official duties with the United States Navy. Here, it is difficult to discern whether or not the explosion was a premeditated incident to provoke war with Spain or even the fact that Sigsbee was a willing participant. It appears, nonetheless, that he was a competent commander, judging from the papers relating to his actions in seizing the British collier and the sinking of a Spanish battleship while in command of the U. Lastly, he was probably a good administrator, as it was his duty to improve the management of the Navy ship yard at League Island, Pennsylvania. Other naval activities documented in detail include his testimony on behalf of Commodore Winfield Schley , his command of the South Atlantic squadron which assisted in the Marine invasion of San Domingo , and transferal of the remains of John Paul Jones from France to the United States Also included are the records of the Maine Monument Association, where he presided over the raising of funds for the monument erected in Washington, D. There are also patents and specifications

for some of his inventions, such as an improvement of the parallel rule , trunk hinges and stays , and electric current regulators Lastly there is a collection of photographs that include views of Sigsbee himself, family members, close friends, naval vessels, the John Paul Jones Exposition , and the dredging and salvage of the U.
